Highest Athletic Award Is Given To Cummings

Jack Cummings of Lower Merion, Pa., graduating University of North Carolina football star, has been voted the Patterson medal, the oldest and generally considered to be the highest athletic award made annually at the University. Cummings, who received his B.S. degree in Industrial Relations Monday, was North Carolina varsity quarterback three seasons. As a junior he was All-Southern and All-Atlantic Coast Conference. He set conference records that season in passing yardage, 1,139, and

touchdowns by passing, 11.

Last year he was awarded the E. Carrington Smith "Most Valuable Player" trophy. He was also named on the Atlantic Coast Conference All-Scholastic team. He was "MVP" in the nationally televised North Carolina-Duke game last fall and has received many other football awards and honors.
