#### Johnson Reaches Accord

SAIGON, South Viet Nam, Saturday (UPI)-Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson reached full agreement today with President Nge Dinh Diem on halting Communist gains in South Viet Nam through a combination military aid and wel-

But his meeting with free Viet Nam officials touched off widespread fears among America's Southeast Asian allies that the United States had begun writing off Laos to the Communist rather than risk a war there.

WASHINGTON-Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, has told Congress the danger of general war is no greater Friday than it was a year ago even though the international situation has deteriorated.


