## **Hodges Visits UNC To Talk** On Economics

Secretary of Commerce Luther H. Hodges visited Chapel Hill for a short time last Friday.

The former governor of North Carolina addressed a meeting of the University of North Carolina -R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company Summer Fellowship Program in Economic Education.

Hodges, a UNC graduate, spoke to the group for about 30 minutes in the Hill Dining Room of the Carolina Inn. He discussed the role of the Department of Commerce in United States economy and told of some of his recent travels as Secretary of this Department.


