Heard Names Holcomb To Grad School

Dr. George R. Holcomb has been appointed associate dean of the Graduate School for research administration, it was announced Monday by Alexander Heard, dean of the Graduate School.

Dr. Holcomb succeeds Dr. William F. Little, who has held the position for the past two and one half years. Dr. Little, an associate professor of chemistry, will return to full time teaching and research in the Chemistry Department.

Dr. Holcomb, an assistant professor in the Department of Anatomy, will have responsibility for grant and contract proposals and other items pertaining to research administration.

A member of the UNC faculty since 1957, Dr. Holcomb completed educational training at the University of Wisconsin, where he received a Ph.D. degree in anthropology.

In addition to his teaching duties in the Department of Anatomy, Dr. Holcomb also teaches in the Department of Sociology and Anthropology.
