

## 4 Students To See Red Festival

band-and-wife team will report directly to North Carolina on the reactions of Asian and African students to Communist propaganda at the Festival.

Four Carolina students will be in attendance when the Communist-sponsored Eighth World Festival of Youth opens Sunday in Helsinki, Finland. The four will join more than 10,000 other students from all parts of the world for the meeting for "Peace and Friendship."

The four, Jim and Christine McCorkel, Roger Foushee, and Jim Roberts, plan to report back to North Carolina their evaluations of the reactions of the African and Asian students to Communist propaganda at the conference.

"We will try," McCorkel said before leaving, "to evaluate the successes and failures of the Communists in their attempt to woo the uncommitted to their party-line views."

### Cultural Propaganda

Mrs. McCorkel, an amateur photographer, will be attacking the problem from another angle as she attempts to analyze the effectiveness of the use of painting, art and music as propaganda.

The Helsinki World Festival, which is described as a cultural and political meeting, is estimated to cost the Soviet government between \$60 and \$120 million. Travel fare for many of the students is being paid by the Soviets, as was also the case at the last such festival in Vienna in 1959.

Political discussions, dramatic and musical events, and sports competitions highlight the week-long meeting. Russian Cosmonauts Titov and Gagarin will also be among the major attractions there.

## Y Schedules Film On Monks

An unrehearsed, filmed interview with monks in the Anglican Community of the Resurrection in Mirfield, England by British Broadcasting Corporation (BBC-TV) will be presented in a public showing by the YMCA-YWCA in Carroll Hall on Monday night. The 30-minute interview which elicits the views of the monks on God, sex, wealth and the meaning of freedom, has been commercially released in the United States under the title "Poverty, Chastity and Obedience."

In a review in the New York Post, film critic Archer Winsten wrote that "There was a kind of personal richness and refinement, wholly visible in these beautifully photographed and studied faces . . . It struck me very

powerfully that this picture was touching basic questions of contemporary life in a way that not one out of one hundred contemporary films attempts. Without attempting any blandishment of entertainment, it spoke directly to the mind and conscience of an intelligent adult. It was fascinating . . . It was a strange and distant and beautiful word, and this picture opened a big clear window on it, showing the emotions in the faces."

Father James L. Devereux and the Rev. DeWitt L. Myers are among a group of panelists who will give their reactions to the film and lead an audience discussion of it. The program will start at 8 p.m. and be open to the public.

## Pediatrician Gets Lifetime Grant In Medical Research

A Career Research Award "for lifetime support of research" has been granted to Dr. Judson J. Van Wyk, research professor of pediatrics at the UNC School of Pediatrics.

The Career Award is among the first made by the National Institute of Health, to provide stable support for established investigators in various schools of medicine. The initial award is for a five year period, but is renewable during the lifetime of the recipient.

Dr. Van Wyk has headed the division of endocrinology in the department of Pediatrics at Chapel Hill since 1955. During this time he has investigated the hormonal changes which occur in women with breast cancer after pituitary stalk section.

These, and other studies carried out with Dr. Gordon S. Dugger, head of the Neurosurgical Division, have been directed toward a clarification of the mechanism by which the hormones

from the adrenal glands, sex glands and thyroid, are controlled by the pituitary.

Dr. Van Wyk has made a number of contributions in the area of abnormal sexual developments. More recently Dr. Van Wyk and his associates have been engaged in studies to determine the causes of simple goiter. With the use of radioactive iodine, it was shown that goiter tends to run in families due to the inheritance of an abnormal protein in the thyroid gland of affected members.

The studies are not being extended to other large pedigrees in which goiter is a common finding.

Dr. Van Wyk is a member of a number of scientific societies, a contributor to the "Textbook of Endocrinology," and is an editor of the "Journal of Clinical Endocrinology and Metabolism." His research publications have been in the fields of endocrinology and pediatrics.
