The inspiration behind these distinctive music-makers began with Greenberg, who organized the group about 10 years ago. The new group was faced with many problems. First an extensive library of scholarly works dealing with medieval and Renaissance music had to be built up and the ancient instruments had to be collected Then it was necessary to find highly qualified and dedicated musicians to interpret and play these early works (that have nothing except the note written down.)

However, the problems have been overcome. On their first tour of Europe they successfully performed the "Play of Daniel" an 'opera' which hadn't been performed since Carolina coeds dress it up for the 13th century.

The early music of the five centuries from 1200 to 1700 is played on musical instruments of that time; recorders, an early transverse flute. cromornes (soft, double-reed wind) instruments), harpsichord, viola da gamba, bass viol, rebec (medieval fiddle), psaltery, hurdy-gurdy, sackbut (an early form of trombone), bells and percussion.

Woollen gym will be sporting new spring fashion colors Saturday night, March 23, when an oriental springtime semiformal dance.


