

to the YMCA by February 15. On the Goettingen Exchange Program, now in its ninth year, two UNC students are sent for a year at the Universitaet Goettingen in northern Germany. Full scholarship, including round-trip transportation, is provided. Students selected must return for at least one year at UNC.

Two German students are sent each year from Goettingen for a year on this campus.

The Carolinians in Goettingen have a chance to immerse themselves in German culture, university life, and academic pursuits. If the student is selective and prearranges his courses, he can receive a full year's credit for his year in Goettingen.

Each Goettingen scholar traditionally spends one or both semesters in the well-known Fridtjof Nansen International House in Goettingen, an old mansion housing 60 foreigners and 60 Germans together.

The Goettingen Scholars are selected on the basis of academic excellence, language proficiency, and character. A student of any major may apply, though he must have had at least one semester of German. Both men and women students are eligible.
