

Kansas City Trailer Courts Deny Home To Negro Airman And Wife

KANSAS CITY (AP) — For a month, the air force and human relations agencies have scoured the Kansas City for a trailer court that will accept John H. Warner and his wife.

The haven't succeeded because the Warners are Negroes. Warner, a 36-year-old Airman First Class who has been in the

Air Force 15 years, has managed to live with his wife for only about 40 months since 1961 because of an overseas duty tour and previous housing troubles at Chanute Air Force Base, Ill.

He was transferred to nearby Richards-Gebaur Air Force Base on Sept. 26 after serving 15 months in the Philippine Islands. But he could locate no trailer court that had space for his mobile home and sent his wife to stay with his sister in Columbus, Ohio.

He now has made a formal request to be transferred to a base in Michigan or Ohio.

Warner, an airplane mechanic, was assigned to Chanute AFB at Rantoul, Ill., in 1961. Housing for Negro airmen near the base was scarce, Warner says, and he

was required to find quarters for his wife in Chicago, 140 miles away. He saw his wife only on weekends for a year and finally bought a house trailer and parked it in an integrated trailer court near the base.

There was a waiting list for government housing for families when he was transferred to the Philippines, so his wife stayed behind.

On transfer to the Missouri base, he canvassed most trailer courts in the area before he sought advice from the base legal officer.

"Some said they didn't have space," Warner said "and others told me they didn't rent to colored. They were polite. I have to give them credit for that one count."

W & L Drops Racial Bars

LEXINGTON, Va. (AP)—Washington & Lee University, a 215-year-old private school where Gen. Robert E. Lee is buried, has opened its doors to Negro students.

Announcement of the decision to drop racial barriers was made today by the University President, Dr. Fred C. Cole. The decision was made last summer by the school's board of trustees.

No applications from Negroes, however, are being considered at this time by the committee on admissions. So far none has

completed an application for admission next term.

Since its founding in 1749 the school has had only one Negro student. He was John Chavis, a free-born Negro who attended in 1802, according to the July 1930 edition of the North Carolina Historical Review.

The trustees' action to drop racial barriers was in the form of a statement to the faculty that admission policies were at the discretion of the faculty-controlled committee on admissions. The faculty reportedly has favored integration in the past.

Gomulka Says Nikita Ouster Was 'Proper'

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Back from a meeting with the new Kremlin leaders, Wladyslaw Gomulka declared Wednesday the Soviet Party leadership accepted Nikita Khrushchev's resignation. "Having proper grounds to do so."

The Polish Party leader then expressed a hope that the rift in world Communism could be healed by the Soviet Union and Red China taking steps to settle their ideological differences.

He described the Kremlin shake-up as in accordance with "Leninist" principles of interparty unity and said Polish-Soviet cooperation will be strengthened.

Gomulka was one of the leaders who had praised Khrushchev after his downfall was announced to the world Oct. 15. Apparently, Poland, like other eastern bloc nations, feared that the Kremlin shakeup might portend a trend back to tighter control from Moscow as in the days of Stalin.

Gomulka met at the border last week with Khrushchev's successors, First Party Secretary Leonid Brezhnev and Premier Alexei Kosygin, who have been trying to reassure the restless eastern bloc. These assurances were given Gomulka personally at the secret meeting.

Addressing a rally for a visiting delegation from Mongolia, Gomulka declared:

"I wish to state here with a full satisfaction that the general line of the Soviet Party as defined by the 20th and 22nd Soviet Party congresses will be upheld and that it fully agrees with our party, our government, our country."

"This has been reaffirmed during our recent meeting with the Soviet Party leaders."

The 20th Congress launched the de-Stalinization campaign. The 22nd Congress promised a greater emphasis on goods for the people.
