

Tar Heels Invade Indiana With Heavy Armor Ready

Gillette has given up sponsoring the Friday Night Fights. Rumors have it that they did so because they are interested in televising first rate brawls.

Our nomination would be televising the home-and-away schedule of the Indiana Hoosier basketball team.

Led by a pair of rugged identical twins, the Van Arsdale, they have thus far rolled over three opponents playing possibly the roughest basketball in the nation.

Both twins, Dick and Tom, measure 6-5½ and weigh around 220 pounds. Dick averaged 22.2 points a game last year with 293 rebounds in 26 games, while Tom had 21.3 and 295 over the same space of time. They are tough under the boards, and are known to use every method possible to get to the ball or eliminate defenders.

6-9 Ron Peyer will be in the pivot, with 6-5 Jon McGlocklin and either 5-10 Al Harden or 6-2 Steve Redenbaugh at the guards.

These six were the top six last year on a team which finished as the biggest disappointment in the Big Ten with a record of 9-15, 5-9 in the conference. However, six of the conference losses came by a total of 15 points, which meant that with any luck their record overall could have been 15-9, 11-4 in the Big Ten.

The Van Arsdales, who were publicized as All-Americans before they even played a game two years ago, were named to Sport Magazine's sophomore All-America team. They haven't lived up to the greatness predicted of them, but they are adequate shooters and hatchet men—supreme on defense.

Last year they constantly lathered Billy Cunningham, once even drawing blood on an artful right cross that Willie Pastrano would have been proud of (Gillette take note), all to no avail as the Heels won 77-70.

According to coach Branch McCracken they just didn't pull together as a team, but this year they seem to be showing signs of it. The most notable improvement has been in Peyer, who last year "wasn't aggressive enough" (no bloody noses). In victories over Ohio

U. Kansas State (at KSU, a feat in itself) and Oklahoma the team has looked like the only possible contender to Michigan in the conference.

Cunningham couldn't help but remember what happened to him physically last year, although he did manage 29 points. However, this year the job will be much tougher, for the Hoosiers are extra tough on their home court in Bloomington. Billy's 48-point explosion Thursday brought his scoring average up to 26.8 and his rebounds to 16.6.

Bobby Lewis (18.0) is slowly but surely rounding into the form hoped of him before the season started, and his sophomore compatriots, Tom Gauntlett (9.8) and Ian Morrison have been playing well. Ray Respass (9.6) will be the other starter.

The game begins at 2, Central Standard Time.

ACC Basketball Will Be Telecast Locally

GREENSBORO (AP)—An eight-week schedule of Saturday afternoon basketball telecasts will be presented in the Atlantic Coast Conference area starting with the Jan. 9 Maryland at South Carolina game.

The games will be carried on a 14-station network, producer C. D. Chesley announced Thursday on the eve of the fall conference meeting.

The complete schedule: Jan. 9—Maryland at South Carolina; 16—Wake Forest at Duke (to be seen in North Carolina and South Carolina) and North Carolina at Virginia (to be seen in Virginia and the District of Columbia); 23—Kentucky at Florida; 30—Maryland at North Carolina.

Feb. 6—West Virginia at Duke; 13—Clemson at South Carolina; 20—Temple at Wake Forest; 27—Duke at North Carolina.

All games will start at 2 p.m. with the exception of the Kentucky-Florida contest which is set for 3 p.m. All ACC teams will be idle that week because of midyear examinations.

Smith Had To Remove Kid

"I pulled him out because I didn't want to take any chance on his getting hurt" said Coach Dean Smith after removing Billy Cunningham with almost six minutes left thus taking away any chance for a new ACC scoring record.

Actually there was no defense necessary, for it would be disastrous for the team to lose either Billy or Bob Lewis (whom he took out with 10 minutes left) with the Indiana and Vanderbilt games coming up.

Smith was obviously very proud of his star. "He earned every point he got. We wanted him to get the record but we also had to play a ball game. Once he got the school record I had to pull him out because he means too much to the team."

The team's play as a whole pleased Smith. "Tom Gauntlett continued to play well, as did Lewis. I was also pleased with the solid job that Mark Mirken did under the boards."

The 47 field goals by the team is another school record, breaking the record of 44 set against South Carolina in 1958.

In what wasn't a great game in that there wasn't much suspense about who was going to win, there were some amusing side-lights.

The crowd has become so pre-

judiced for Cunningham, Lewis and Gauntlett that it booted not only Smith for taking them out, but their replacements for having the audacity to play.

Tulane's 6-7 Nels Siegert helped Lewis prepare for the Van Arsdale match by knocking him around the court. Siegert got some of the Carolina hospitality when half the student section stood up and booed him when he fouled out.

Cheerleader Judy Tucker almost went berserk when fiance Ray Hassell pumped in his first basket of the year.

Finally there was Craig Spitzer, 7-1 Craig Spitzer, Tulane's sub center. Other than getting his arm caught in the basket before the game, he saw only enough action to miss three field goal

attempts and a foul shot. When he pulled down a rebound there were whispers that the new Willie Chamberlain might be playing in Woolen Gym . . . not yet anyway.

It really wasn't much of a game at all. Tulane's basketball program has bogged down in the past few years.

Maybe they'd better stick to football.
