

Nile River Trip Is Film Lecture Topic Wednesday

Graham Memorial will sponsor a film lecture on ancient and modern Egypt at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday in Memorial Hall.

The lecturer, Capt. Irving Johnson, USNR, sailed down the Nile River filming the vast Delta country which is the home of a civilization and culture that has existed for over 6,000 years.

He and photographers from the National Geographic Magazine photographed ancient monuments which archaeologists are struggling to preserve from the new Aswan Dam.

Johnson's boat is the last foreign vessel to sail above the new dam before it submerges this area under millions of tons of water.

Johnson includes in his film the six-story-high images of Abu Simbil, which UNESCO engineers are cutting apart, stone by stone, and raising to a higher plateau.

Other features in the film include the El Alamein battleground, the great pyramid, and the contrast of old and new Egypt.

Student admission is free with ID card, adult tickets are 75 cents. Family tickets cost \$1.50.

Scripts may be borrowed from the library reserve reading room or from Dramatic Arts office, 307 Bynum.

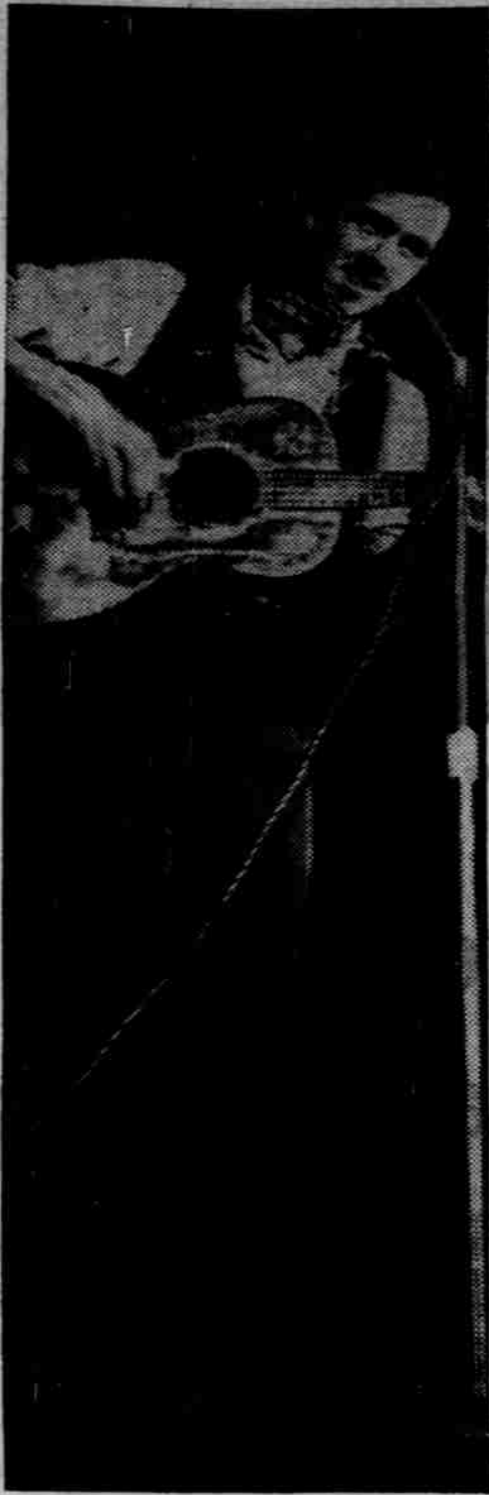
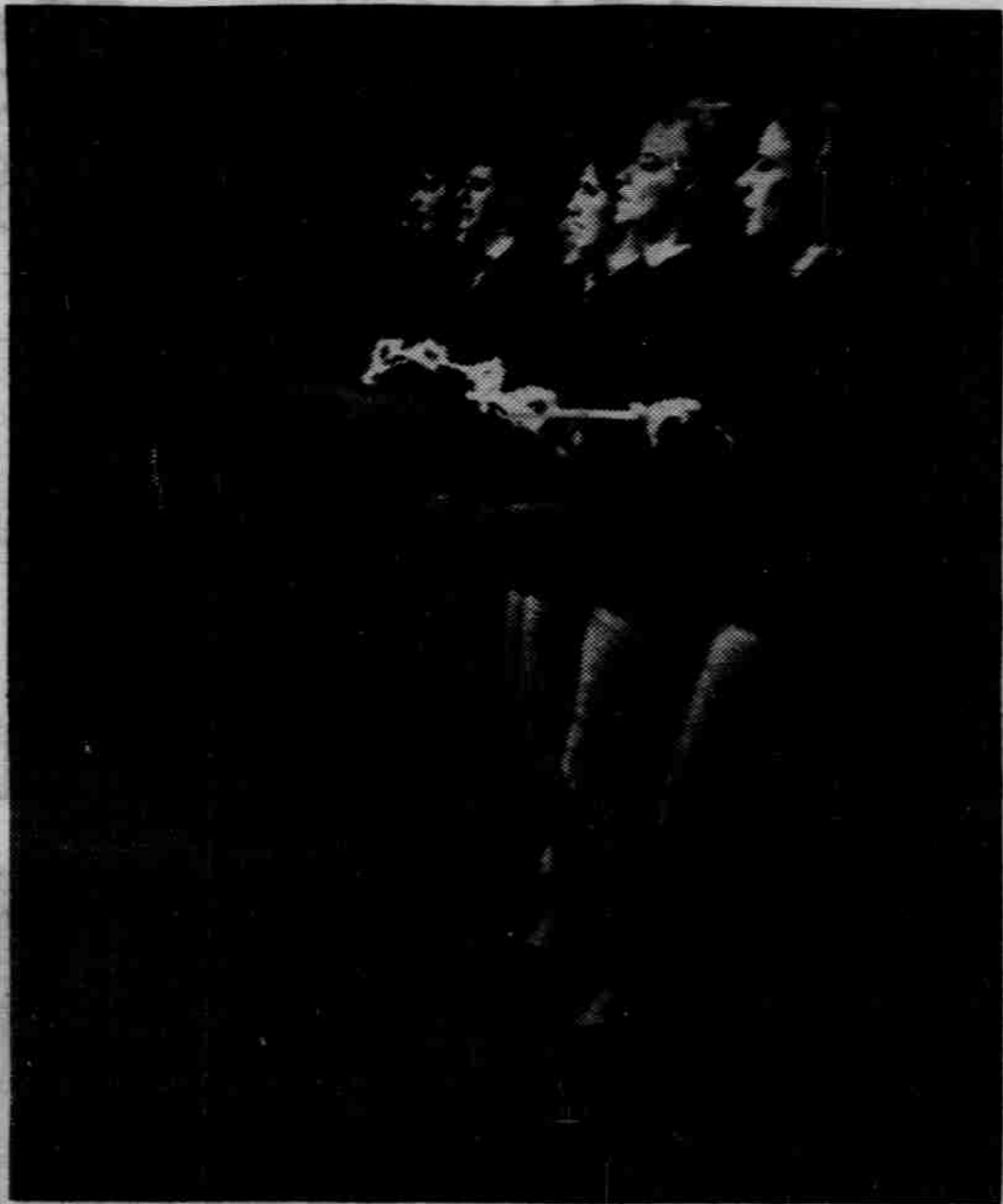
Production dates for "Billy Budd" will be March 30 through April 4.

Brecht Resigns Position As Pharmacy School Dean

Dr. Edward A. Brecht Jr., dean of the School of Pharmacy for nearly 15 years, resigned Friday, effective June 30. He will return to fulltime teaching and research in the School of Pharmacy. No indication was made as to when a

successor would be appointed. The resignation was announced by Chancellor Paul F. Sharp at a special Pharmacy School faculty meeting Friday afternoon.

Dean Brecht came to Chapel Hill in 1939 as an instructor in pharmacy. It was his first teaching position after receiving his Ph.D. from the University of Michigan.

He was promoted to full professor in 1946 and became dean in 1950. Dr. Brecht resigned the deanship late last March but reconsidered his decision and withdrew the resignation one month later.

Dr. Brecht is a 53-year-old native of Minnesota Lake, Minn., where he was a part-time pharmacist for 18 years. He has been secretary of the North Carolina Pharmaceutical Research Foundation since 1946.
