over into things other than western movies this right and wrong concept.

There was a fellow on campus couple of weeks ago and he wasn't a westerner at all although his organization had a romantic name like in the movies and it was called the John Birch Society.

And this fellow, just as an example, said that there are only three things in the whole world—God, country and evil.

He told a group in Graham Memorial that he and his romantic-sounding group were for the first two and against the third. Everybody thought that was nice, but even the post-war babies who were there and hadn't been indoctrinated to the black and white, right and wrong philosophy as much as the older students thought that was just a little too simple.

And over in Durham this past weekend a CORE official named Floyd McKissick argued with a grocery store that it shouldn't sell chickens because these were

Mississippi chickens and that would be breaking the economic boycott on products from the deep-south state.

And somebody said that a store should be able to sell whatever it wanted to and that it didn't matter where the chicken came from that a wishbone broke the same in any state and that McKissick was making it too easy, this black and white thing.

And maybe both these men were partially right and maybe they were partially wrong but it was evident that there was no clear-cut black and white assumption by the way they were dressed or the color horses they rode, because neither did.

And while all this was going on the Lone Ranger died over a bridge hand in Wisconsin and part of the right and wrong and black and white era died with him and maybe it's good that this era be buried because things move faster than Silver now and it's pretty hard to apply the old rule to Viet Nam or civil rights demands.

Cancer Grant Renewed At UNC

Dr. Claude Piantadosi, professor of Pharmaceutical Chemistry at the UNC School of Pharmacy, has been granted a renewal of research grant from the Cancer Institute of the National Institutes of Health in the amount of \$63,000 for a three-year period.

The title of the grant is, "Potential Anticancer Agents-Classical and Non-Classical Antimetabolites." Collaborating as co-investigators are Dr. J. Logan Irvin, Professor and chairman, Department of Biochemistry, UNC School of Medicine and Dr. Shu-Sing Cheng, Instructor in Biochemistry.
