A 17-year-old sophomore has been named one of the five highest ranking students in the 25th annual William Lowell Putnam Mathematical Competition. He is Fred William Roush, son

mathematical competition held in December. Roush is ranked with two Harvard students, one from the University of California at Berkeley and one from California Institute

sented them framed certificates citing them "for academic diligence under the classroom dome of the Morehead Planetarium in quest for orbits of higher achievement." The certificates, carying the

great seal of the University, were validated by signatures of Sharp and A. F. Jenzano, director of the Planetarium. "We're very proud of our new status," said Grissom.

"He has more tar on his heels than I have," Sharp quipped. Grissom has received special training at the Planetarium many times since 1960. Sharp has been chancellor at Chapel Hill since last September.

All U. S. astronauts receive training in mock-up space capsules under the Morehead Planetarium dome. The planetarium instrument simulates the sky as it will appear during all proposed orbits. After training the astronauts are able to tell by looking at the stars whether their capsules are in the proper attitude during actual or-

"We have certificates for all 29 astronauts who have studied here," Sharp said. "We will forward them to the NASA Manned Spacecraft Center at Houston for individual distribution."

Jenzano commented, "All the astronauts who have orbited so far have, in a sense, been Chapel Hill alumni. I am glad to see it made official."


