Five Faculty Members Scheduled To Retire At End Of This Year

Five University of North Carolina faculty members with a combined teaching service of almost 175 years are retiring at the end of this academic year.

They are Drs. Isabelle Carter, professor of social work; Earl H. Hartsell, associate professor of English; Gerald R. McCarthy, professor of geology and geophysics; H. D. Meyer, professor of sociology and anthropology; and R. B. Sharpe, professor of English.

Dr. Carter, who joined the faculty in 1937, has been active as a social worker in the field as well as teacher of the practice of social casework.

The Isabelle Kirkland Carter Award recently was established here in her honor and will be given annually to the outstanding social worker in North Carolina.

Hartsell, who joined the faculty as instructor in 1936 and took his undergraduate and graduate degrees from UNC, teaches and does research in 19th century English literature. McCarthy is a former chairman of the Department of Geology and in 1958 was elected president of the North Carolina Academy of Science. He has been on the faculty here since 1922 and is the author of numerous articles in the fields of geology and geophysics.

Student government has invested over \$500 in the project this year. Biggest expenses are printing and duplicating, the cost of programming, and electrographic pencils which are six cents apiece.

Some of these costs will not

have to be repeated in future years, however.

In addition to the free assistance of the Durham Telephone Company, Durwood Roberts, Chapel Hill IBM representative, donated his time to help in designing the answer card.

Froneberger and Adkinson said that course evaluation is a long range program which some day will go beyond the use of individual professors.

When enough data has been

gathered, an entire department may be evaluated.

Furthermore, there may be an analysis according to student grades. Professors apparently think that poor students give poor evaluations. "However," Adkinson said, "there seems to be a trend, as indicated by the pilot project, that D and F students evaluate as well as A and B students." Froneberger said the C students were the most critical of all.

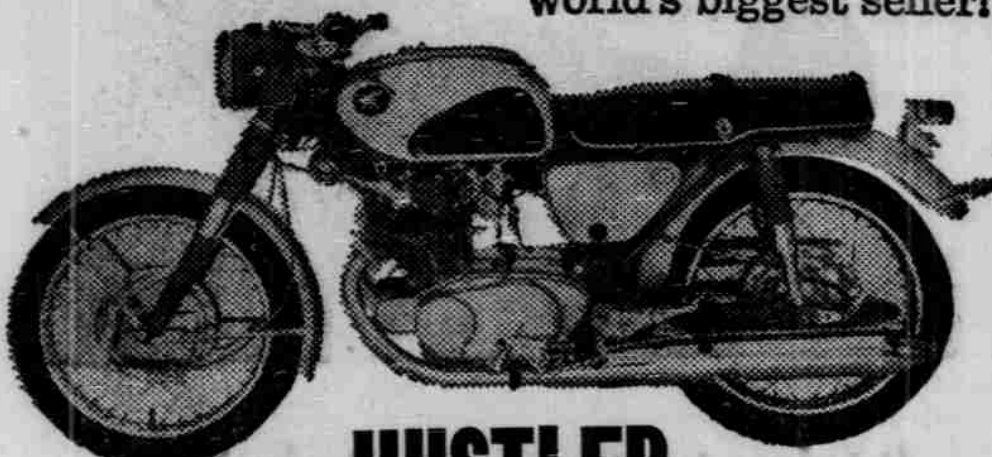
