the highway commission would then reject the entire project. He said the board was supposed to protect the "interested people," not the planning boards "who have no money involved! in this." He said the plan was "not constitutional, it's immoral, and it's not right."

Many of the people opposed the radial because it would devalue property and, in some cases, cut through their houses. Wesley H. Wallace, UNC pro-fessor and one of the Chapel Hill planning board members who opposed the plan, showed that an interchange built where the radial would cross U. S.



15-501 would put at least three houses on islands within the loops and go through another house. He opposed the highway commission's insistence on the radial, saying "The principle of local autonomy is a good principle."


Barton was given a five to seven - year suspended sentence and was placed on five - year probation.



Continued military expansion in Viet Nam, Lipsitz said, "could easily bring a largescale response from North Viet Nam's army, which, though poorly supplied, is very zeal-

Viet Nam, said Lipsitz, is not like Malaya or the Philippines, where existing governments successfully crushed guerrilla movements.

"In Malaya," he said, "the

insurgents were often of a different race. The central government was popular and the area in which the guerrillas could operate was more restricted." Lipsitz generally approved of the President's offer to provide more economic aid to the countries of Southeast Asia.

Weissman will give a public address at 8 tomorrow night in Gerrard on "Berkley: The Crisis of the American University." As Chairman of the Graduate Coordinating Committee of the Free Speech Movement and as a member of the overall Steering Committee, he was very actively involved in the events at Berkley last fall.

About a month ago, Weissman gave up this position to work for the Students for a Democratic Society.

Hefner will lead a panel discussion on "The Playboy Philosophy' 'at 8 p.m. Monday in Memorial Hall.




