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the highway commission would then reject the entire project. He said the board was supposed to protect the "interested people," not the planning boards "who have no money involved in this." He said the plan was "not constitutional, it's immoral, and it's not right."

Many of the people opposed the radial because it would devalue property and, in some cases, cut through their houses. Wesley H. Wallace, UNC professor and one of the Chapel Hill planning board members who opposed the plan, showed that an interchange built where the radial would cross U. S.

15-501 would put at least three houses on islands within the loops and go through another house. He opposed the highway commission's insistence on the radial, saying "The principle of local autonomy is a good principle."

Arsonist Given Suspended Term

Charles Albert Barton, former Morehead scholar from Charlotte, was convicted of arson Thursday in Orange County Superior Court in connection with a fire which gutted a portion of the Phi Delta Theta house March 22 last year.

Barton was given a five to seven-year suspended sentence and was placed on five-year probation.

In addition, he was ordered to pay \$2,200 for damage to the house plus court costs.

A former member of the fraternity, the then 19-year-old sophomore had been deactivated in the spring of 1963 for scholastic reasons.

ill of Southeast Asia." "If Johnson made this statement, then he was either a fool or a liar," Lipsitz said.

Johnson, according to Lipsitz, "still uses too much stick and not enough carrot."

"The administration," he said, "has unduly emphasized the military phase of the struggle. Johnson doesn't understand that political, social and economic considerations must come first."

Lipsitz claimed that Secretary of State Dean Rusk, presidential assistant MacGeorge Bundy, together with Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara, are among the persons "highly responsible for our foreign policy shortcomings."

Lipsitz congratulated President Johnson for "showing as much restraint as he has, considering the views of those around him."

Continued military expansion in Viet Nam, Lipsitz said, "could easily bring a large-scale response from North Viet Nam's army, which, though poorly supplied, is very zealous."

Viet Nam, said Lipsitz, is not like Malaya or the Philippines, where existing governments successfully crushed guerrilla movements.

"In Malaya," he said, "the insurgents were often of a different race. The central government was popular and the area in which the guerrillas could operate was more restricted."

Lipsitz generally approved of the President's offer to provide more economic aid to the countries of Southeast Asia.

Free Speech And Playboy Forum Talks

Dr. Steve Weissman, a leader in last fall's Free Speech Movement at Berkeley, and Hugh Hefner, editor of "Playboy" magazine and father of the "Playboy Philosophy," will speak on campus tomorrow night and May 10 respectively, sponsored by the Carolina Forum.

Weissman will give a public address at 8 tomorrow night in Gerrard on "Berkeley: The Crisis of the American University."

As Chairman of the Graduate Coordinating Committee of the Free Speech Movement and as a member of the overall Steering Committee, he was very actively involved in the events at Berkeley last fall.

About a month ago, Weissman gave up this position to work for the Students for a Democratic Society.

Hefner will lead a panel discussion on "The Playboy Philosophy" at 8 p.m. Monday in Memorial Hall.

An incomplete list of panel members includes Dr. Clifford Reiter, of the Psychology Department, Rabbi Joseph Levine, director of the Hillel Foundation, and Daryl Farrington, assistant dean of women.

Bill Schwartz, co-chairman of the Forum, said yesterday that "no bunnies will come along."

Hefner started "Playboy" magazine in 1953, following his resignation from "Esquire," and has seen its circulation grow to more than 3,018,000.

CORE Director James Farmer Will Speak On Civil Rights

National CORE Director James Farmer will speak here Monday on "The Future of the Civil Rights Revolution." The controversial civil rights leader will talk at 8 p.m. in Memorial Hall.

Monday will be Farmer's second appearance in Chapel Hill. In January last year, he focused national attention on the community by issuing his "D-Day" ultimatum which demanded that the town desegregate its public facilities and become an "open city" by Feb. 1, 1964.

Farmer is a graduate of Willey College and Howard University School of Divinity. After graduation he refused to be ordained in the Methodist ministry because: "I didn't see how I could honestly preach the Gospel of Christ in a church that practiced discrimination."

Farmer was one of the founders of CORE in 1942 at the University of Chicago. He has been active in rights work since then, speaking and taking part in demonstrations in all parts of the nation.

His appearance here will be sponsored by UNC NAACP. A public reception will be held in Graham Memorial after the address.
