Schoeder said there are at least 64 letters circulating in Chapel Hill if the six persons listed at the bottom of the letter have "sold" the letters as the letter explains. Thus far only one copy has been turned in to Schroeder

but he said he has heard about three or four others. He said there could be more of the letters in the area than is indicated by the number of names on the letter. Schroeder said that one stip-

ulation in the letter, which explains a money - making scheme by selling two of the letters, is that the letter not be mailed. He said it is explained in the

letter that it began at another southern university and is circulating on the campuses of several other colleges and uni-

The investigation is being made in order to stop the letters before they go any farther, Schroeder said.

"We want to warn students not to get involved in anything like this," he said.
