## Heels Third In Both Polls

Unless the UCLA Bruins stumble against Stanford and California this weekend they are almost certain to finish as the overwhelming leaders in the final Associated Press major college basketball poll. The Bruins, unbeaten in 23 games, were named the No. 1 team by all 32 sports writers and broadcasters on the AP's national panel in the latest poll. This marked the seventh consecutive week that they were the unanimous choices. UCLA faces Stanford Friday and California Saturday before concluding its regular season March 1 against Southern California. Second-ranked Louisville and ninth-ranked Texas West-

ern already have completed their regular campaigns. North Carolina, No. 3, has two games left, against South Carolina Wednesday and Duke Saturday. Kansas, No. 4, has left on its schedule Nebraska Saturday, Colorado on March 6 and Kansas State March 11. Princeton, No. 5, plays its final season game Wednesday against Penn. Sixth-ranked Western Kentucky, Houston, No. 7, and Boston College, No. 10, wind up their seasons Saturday. The Hilltoppers meet Middle Tennessee, Houston takes on the Air Force and Boston College goes against Holy Cross. Eight-ranked Tennessee has three games remaining. The Vols tackle North Carolina State Wednesday, Louisi-

ana State Saturday and Mississippi State next Monday. The final poll will be taken after this Saturday's games and the results will be compiled next Monday. Louisville held the runner-up in the latest balloting based on games through last Saturday. The Cardinals collected 53 points on the usual basis of 10 for a first-place vote, 9 for second etc. North Carolina advanced two places to third after beating Maryland and Virginia Tech. Kansas held fourth place while Princeton rushed up one notch into fifth. Western Kentucky fell from third to sixth, the result of its setback by Murray. Houston remained in seventh position. Tennessee and Texas Western climbed one spot each, the Vols to eighth and the Miners to ninth while Syracuse, eighth a week ago, dropped out of the first 10. Syracuse, beaten by St. John's of New York and Canisius, was replaced in the rankings by Boston College. The Eagles have won 17 games and lost only two.

# ACC Title Game Tonight

The UNC Tar Heels go after the regular season championship tonight when they invade Carolina Field House to play the Gamecocks of South Carolina.

A win tonight by the Heels would give them the championship and send them into the tournament next week at Greensboro seated number one, regardless of how they do Saturday against Duke.

The Tar Heels will be going up against one of the toughest defenses in the conference tonight. The Gamecocks have only been giving up an average of 65.8 pts. per game while scoring at a pace of 75.2 pts. per game.

Their tremendous defense can mainly be attributed to tremendous power on the backboards. Gary Greger, 6'9", forward leads the way with an average of 14.1 rebounds per game. In 19 games, Greger grabbed 268 rebounds and set a school record against Elon when he grabbed 35 rebounds. Greger is also the second leading scorer on the team with an average of 14.1 pts. per game.

This will be the second meeting between these teams this season. The Tar Heels won the first one 80-55 in the opening game of the North-South Doubleheader. The game was billed as a close game with the Heels favored by a few points, but they used some deadly shooting and a tough defense to easily handle the Gamecocks then.

"We've got just one objective to accomplish this week," said Coach Frank McGuire yesterday. "It is to get Standard back into playing form and ready for the tournament next week."

The Gamecocks presently have a 13-5 season record and are 6-4 in the conference. They are now assured of finishing in fourth place in the standings and will most likely face Maryland in their first game of the tournament next week.

The game will be televised tonight on Channel 8.

## Carolina Freshmen Produce Talent

Carolina may not have won the ACC Indoor Games, but the performance of Coach Newnam's freshmen brought optimism to the future of Carolina track.

The Tar Heel yearlings finished second to Maryland. However, they made one of the finest showings of the past few years in this important meet.

Next year Jon Levin, who finished third in the conference, will no longer be in the Carolina blue. However, sophomore Dave Danady and frosh Sellers and Olukoton will return to fill in the varsity level. In the freshmen finals on Saturday evening Sellers placed second to Joshua Collins of Clemson, and Olukoton finished fifth. With a year's experience these two sprinters should help the varsity cause next season.

In the hurdles Carolina has lacked a strong performer for the past three years. However, in the frosh division of the 70 yd. high, freshmen Beck, Swich and Patterson finished first, second and fourth respectively. These hurdlers along with sophs Dave Lassiter and Sonny Korngay may make this a strong event in the future.

With the departure of Ed Daw in the 600 yd. run, Ted Norman, who finished third Saturday, should be able to give this event a topflight competitor.

Frosh C. W. Markham, who placed fourth this past weekend in the 1000, will move up to the varsity next year and could push junior Bill Bassett, who placed second in the conference run.

Carolina should be outstanding this spring and next year in the distances. Freshmen Bob Frederick and Ken Helms placed second and fifth in the Frosh mile and will add extra strength to the present corps of outstanding distant men.

In the broad jump sprinter Sellers will add depth to this event as he placed third in the ACC meet and along with Gary Iverson, could make this the Tar Heel's strongest one-two punch.

From the fine performance of these freshmen last weekend, Carolina's track future looks bright. The dominance of Maryland is beginning to fade in some events. Carolina seems the most likely team to overcome the Terp team to overcome the next stronghold. Within the next two or three years, Carolina fans may be able to go to an of victory.
