VWU Swimmers Meet Blue Dolphins Today

When the Vanilla Water University swimming team takes on the UNC Blue Dolphins at Frostbite Falls today, it will be laying its reputation seriously damaged by a 1-6 record so far this season on the line.

The VWU Cream Rinse are trying hard to redeem themselves in the face of heated campus controversy stemming from their loss of six of their seven meets so far this season.

The VWU campus newspaper, the Dirty Chocolate Cavity, recently questioned the allotting of \$250,000 annually on a losing swim team.

Although swimming is VWU's biggest money-earner and is popular with the alumni, the Cavity called for a greater allocation of funds to the bean-bag team, which placed fourth nationally last year.

Newly-hired coach Wilbur "Red" Hickey replied to the Cavity that if the reputation of his Saturday "heroes" was again questioned, he would re-

taliated by scheduling all meets on Sunday.

Frostbite Falls' bars immediately protested Hickey's plan, however. They claimed that tucking in the swimmers early on Saturday night would seriously cut their revenues.

Hickey remarked on his WUSA television program that, "the game of swimming is like the game of life, and criticism of our team is as heretic as questioning the H.U.A.C."

Student Body Vice-Squad President J. E. Duntz was pressured into an immediate investigation of the Cavity.

Duntz said, "The time is out of joint. O cursed spite that I was ever born to set it right. Think of all the votes I'll lose from the left."

Other elements in the student body blame a lack of team spirit for the losing season, however.

Swimming Captain Charlie Sportsarr, a \$60,000 Mortehead Scholarship student, disagreed, however.

When asked if the team had esprit de corps anymore, he replied, "sometimes for dinner, but mostly we get steaks."

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3 Tie For Co-Rec Title

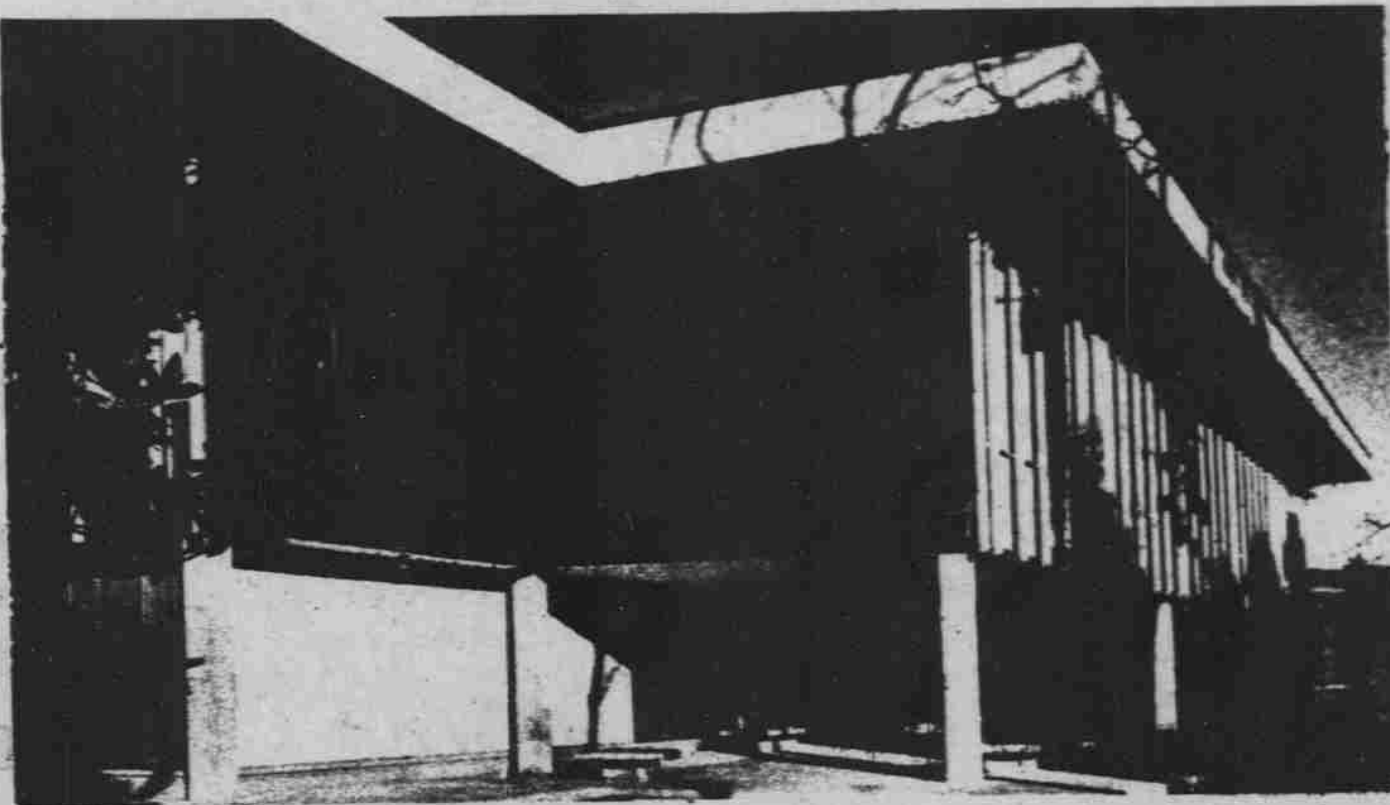
The 1967 campus Co-Rec tournament held in Woollen Gym resulted in a three way tie.

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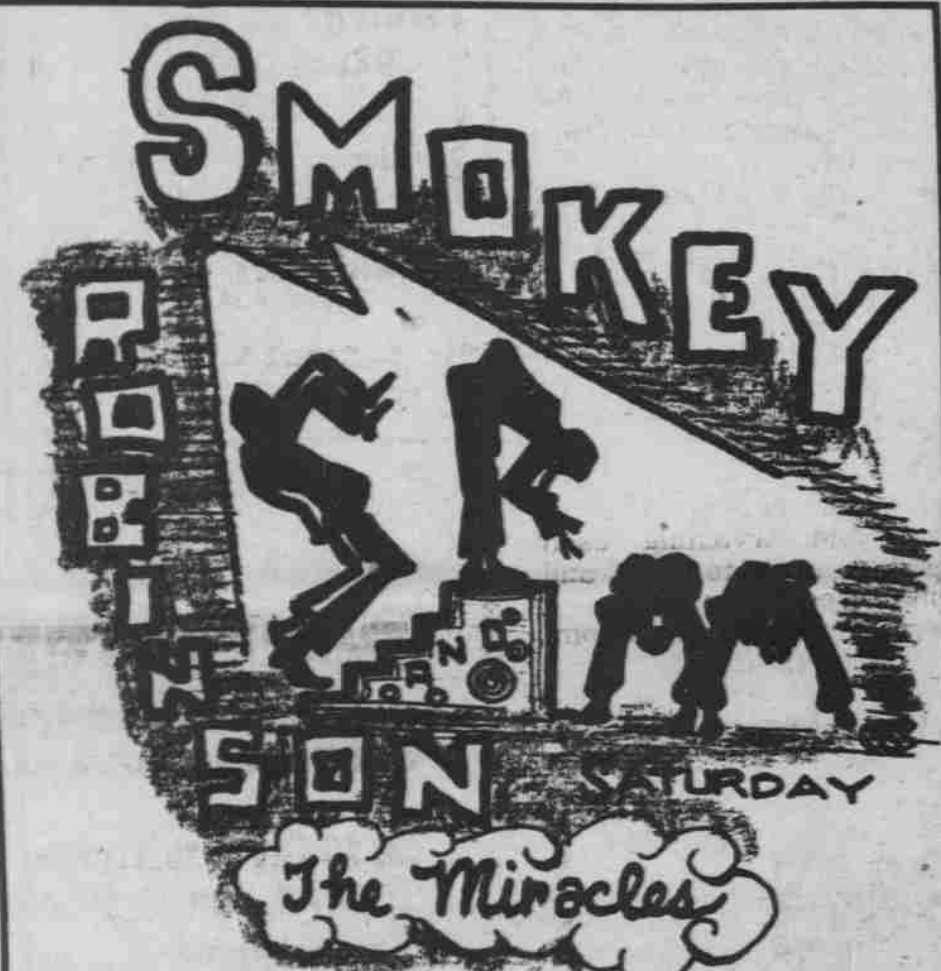
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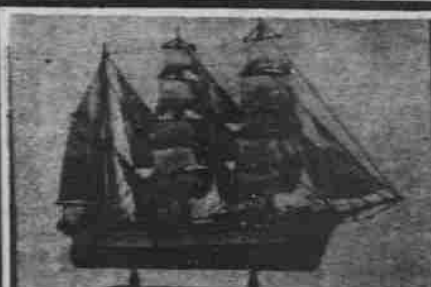
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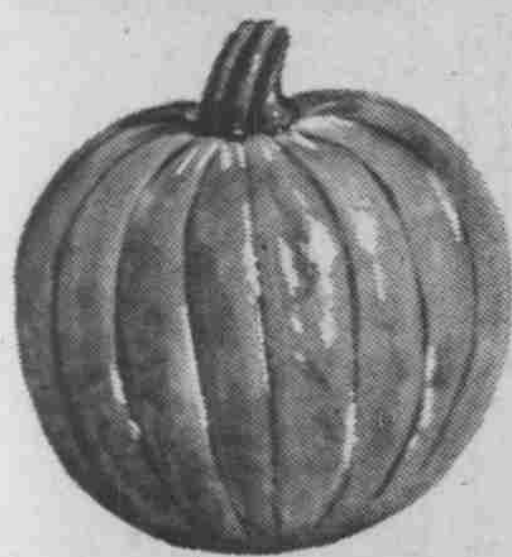
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
