Wheeler walked to a wall of shelves lining the small laboratory adjoining his office in the University's Elisha Mitchell Hall. He pulled open a drawer full of apparently common sea shells.

"These are 60 million years old," he said. "Yesterday." He pulled open another

drawer and produced part of a jaw bone from a Mosasaur, a 30-foot long marine lizard from the age of dinosaurs, some 80million years ago.

The bone is just a fragment, but from it Wheeler, who has been interested in fossils since he was a boy, can practically reconstruct the entire lizard.




