Fast Break Leads To Win

North Carolina's Tar Babies used a well-balanced scoring attack and a blistering fast break to carve out an 80-60 victory over the Virginia Cavayearlings at Carmichael Auditorium last night.

The UNC frosh placed all five of its starters in double figures with Dave Chadwick's 16 leading the way. The Heels got numerous lay-ups and these easy baskets took the steam out of Virginia.

The visitors never led in the ACC contest, although the score was tied three times at 2, 4, and 6. Carolina led by 16 twice in the first half at 32-16 and 35-19.

The big reason UNC opened such a lead in the opening period was a five minute dry spell by Virginia in which the Cavayearlings were outscored 10-0. During that streak, the Heels went from a 22-16 lead to a 32-16 advantage.

Richard Tuttle got two lay-ups and Dale Gipple hit an outside jumper for six of the points. Lee Dedmon hit two free throws and Don Eggleston scored from inside for the other four.

Carolina led 36-23 at the half. Gipple, who finished with 15 points, hit 4 of 6 shots for eight markers in the first stanza.

Virginia, in suffering its fifth loss in eight outings, threatened to come back in the second period. The Cavayearlings, with Kevin Kennelly popping a couple of jumpers from a downtown, pulled to within 11 at 52-41 with 10:11 to go.

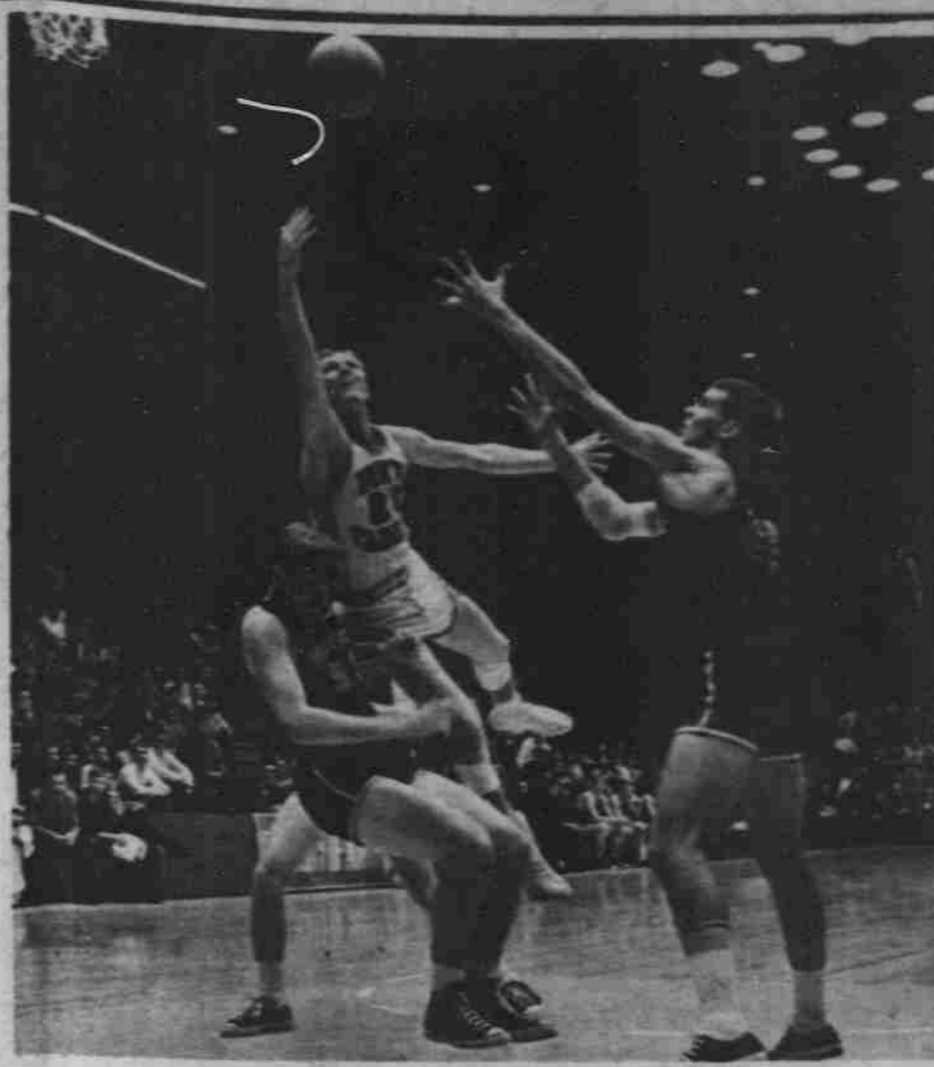
Three straight lay-ups took the life out of the UVA

freshmen, however. Lee Dedmon, who made some nice inside feeds, hit Chadwick for a snowbird. Tuttle fired to Dedmon and Chadwick fed Gipple as the Tar Babies pulled away.

Coach Bill Guthridge substituted freely throughout the game. Even with reserves in, Carolina ran up a 26 point margin at 80-54 with 1:21 left.

Kennelly scored 15 for Virginia. High man for UVA was center Bill Gerry with 16. Bill Fulton also hit double figures with 10.

Dedmon and Eggleston had 11 each for UNC and Tuttle added 10. Jim Bradford tallied six in a sub role. Dedmon captured 12 rebounds, Chadwick had 9 and Eggleston 8.

Varsity, Frosh Grapplers Meet Wm. & Mary Here

The UNC varsity and freshman wrestling teams will host the William and Mary grapplers tonight in Carmichael Auditorium at 7 o'clock.

Carolina presently has a 3-3-1 record. The most recent loss came at Virginia Tech Saturday. The Gobblers strangled the UNC matmen there by a 31-6 score.

Carolina will be led in the meet with William and Mary by big Fred Priester. The 177-pounder has won five matches this season while losing only to David Bryan of Davidson, the Southern Conference heavyweight champion.

Priester wrestles in both the 177-pound and heavyweight

divisions and has accumulated 17 total points—high for the team.

Tom Rumley, sophomore from Reidsville, is upholding the honors in the 145-pound division. He has won two matches with no losses this season for 10 points.

John Stacy and Tommy Guthrie, 137- and 130-pounds respectively have both collected nine points. Stacy has won three matches against no losses. Guthrie has an even 3-3 record.

Carver Rudolph, 160-pound sophomore, has won two matches and lost none in picking up six points. Bob Steele at 167 pounds has won two matches and dropped one in picking up eight points.

Coach Sam Barnes' grapplers have had more than their share of problems this season. The team, according to Barnes "is very talented, but awfully green."

No new teams appeared in nited Press International's up Ten this week although ere was a reshuffling of five sitions in the poll.

Houston, UCLA and North rolina remained 1-2-3 while he hung on to 10th place hough the Blue Devils sorbed an 83-80 loss to South rolina.

Houston beat Fairfield 108-76 d Marshall 102-93 to remain the top position with a 20-0 ord. The Cougars have the ggest winning streak in ma- college basketball with 21 eight wins.

UCLA, 16-1, bounced urther California 101-67 to d on to second and move within only 10 points of the Cougars. Carolina upped its mark to 14-1 with 86-80 and 73-67 victories over Florida State and Maryland. The Heels lost seven points in the poll, however.

Tennessee, sixth last week, jumped to fourth after previously fourth-ranked New Mexico lost its first game of the season. The Vols, 14-2, whipped Mississippi State and Mississippi to cling to first place in the Southeastern Conference.

New Mexico fell one notch to fifth after losing a squeaker to Arizona, 69-68. Unbeaten St. Bonaventure, 16-0, surprisingly dropped one place to sixth even though the Bonnies beat Villanova 66-62 in their only game.

Columbia remained in seventh with a 13-3 mark with two wins, one a 69-60 victory

over conference rival Princeton to vault the Lions into first place in the Ivy League.

Daytona To Have Cyclones

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (UPI)—Mario Andretti, Cale Yarborough and Lee Roy Yarborough reportedly will pilot speedy new Mercury Cyclones Sunday in qualifying for the rich Daytona 500 auto race Feb. 25.

Although the Ford-Mercury factory team lineup has not officially been announced, reports at Daytona International Speedway indicated Tuesday that other members of the seven-man team will be A. J. Foyt, Jack Bowsher, Bobby Allison and Donnie Allison. The latter four will drive Ford Torinos.

Torinos finished 1-2-3 at the last big NASCAR race at Riverside, Calif., but the Cyclones have been turning the Daytona track about a mile-an-hour faster than the Fords in practice runs so far.

Sunday's qualifying will determine the pole position winner and the outside starting driver for the 500, which will draw more than 100,000 stock racing fans.

The qualifying speeds will also determine the starting positions for two 125-mile races Feb. 23. The 125-milers in turn will determine the starting lineup behind the frontrunners in the rich 500-mile race.

The speedway announced Tuesday that at least six Plymouths will be running against the Ford factory team. The cars will be driven by Richard Petty, Charlie Glotzbach, Darel Dieringer, Jerry Grant, Sam McQuagge and Bobby Isaac.

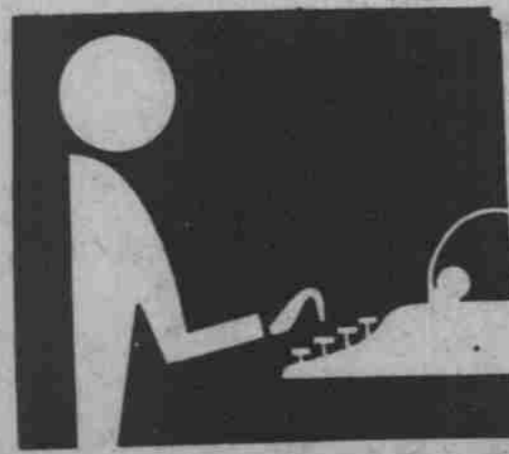
