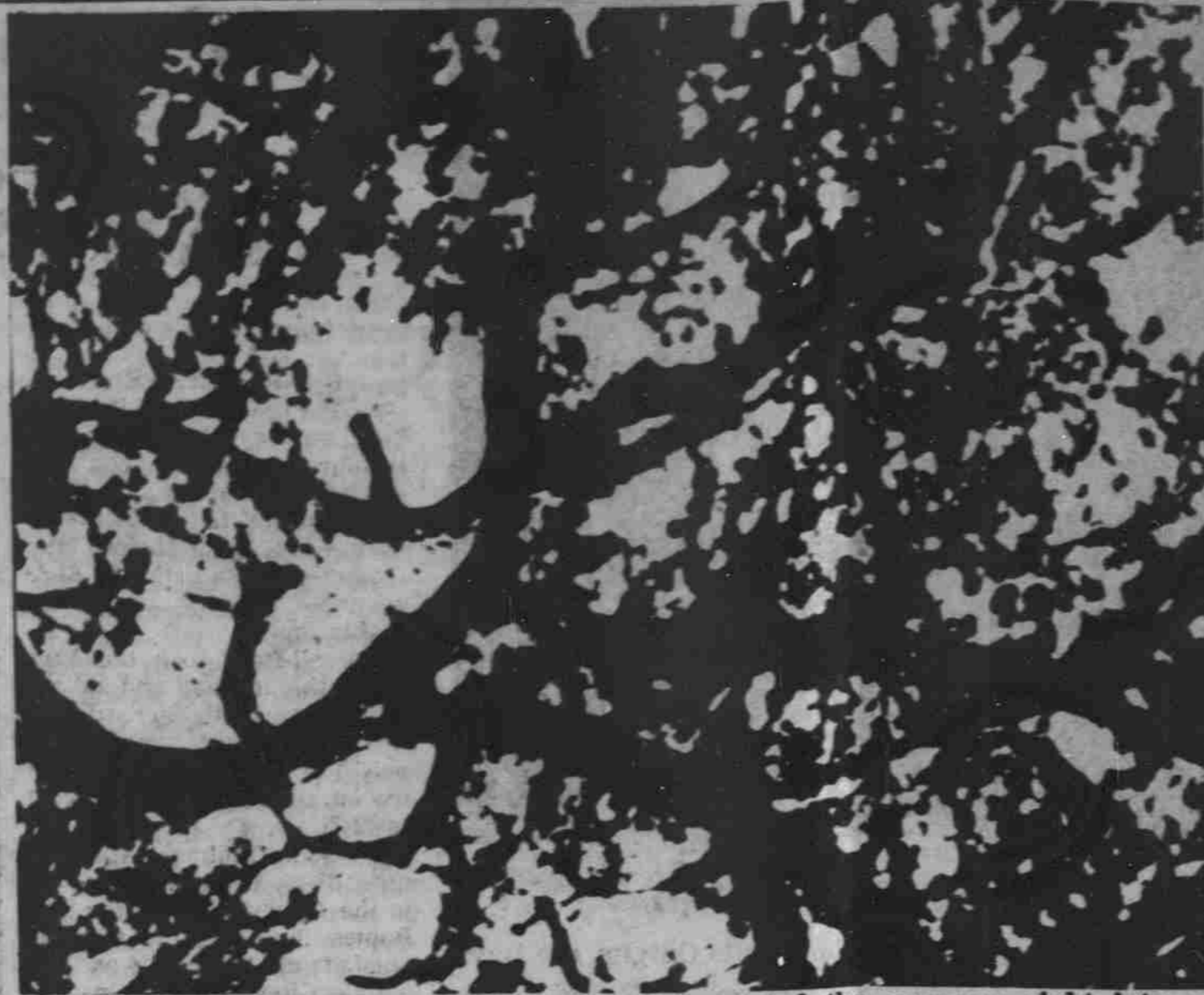

Hawkins Pays Filing Fee; \$350—All In Silver Coins

RALEIGH — Dr. Reginald Hawkins, Charlotte dentist who said he is the first Negro ever to run for Governor of North Carolina, paid his \$350 fee in small change Wednesday and said he is the candidate of all the poor people.

Hawkins again challenged his opponents in the Democratic Primary to debate him "across this state." He said the greatest issues in the state are "race and poverty."

Hawkins, 44, said he is for raising the per capita income, better education especially at the lower grade levels, and adequate housing. Asked whether his programs would cause more taxes, he said "Yes, a lot more money." He said he would raise the money by taxing cigarettes ("I don't represent the tobacco industry") and by a tax on liquor-by-the-drink. He said he definitely favors legalizing liquor-by-the-drink sales because "we drink it by the fifth, don't we?"

Hawkins said he is against more taxes on food or real estate because "these are taxes on the poor."

Hawkins said the Governor definitely should have the veto power and be allowed to succeed himself.

ASHEBORO — Republican Senatorial candidate Edwin Tenney of Chapel Hill and Congressional candidate Fred Steele met with GOP leaders in Asheboro and Randolph County Wednesday.

Tenney said, "The present government has absolutely ridiculed the character of the American nation."

"Our word is no longer good," he said. "And we are involved in a childish game of war in Vietnam."

Steele said he would "offer constructive and responsible alternatives to the irresponsible programs" of the administration.

More Americans die annually from diseases of the heart and blood vessels than from all other diseases, accidents, and other causes combined, Dunivant said.

A publication by the American Heart Association has indicated a number of ways to reduce the risk of heart attack.

Contributions to the Heart Fund will include aid in public education, medical research, heart transplants, and rehabilitation programs for those who have already suffered from heart attacks and strokes.

Since 1950 the year after the first Heart Fund Campaign the death rate for people below 65 has dropped by 17 per cent.

Sigma Nu undertook the project in connection with George Coxhead, who is President of the Orange County Heart Association and Chairman of the Sigma Nu Board of Trustees, and with A.V. Combs who is a field consultant for the N.C. Heart Association, according to Dunivant.
