# Students Dig

For the fifth summer, UNC and Duke University are collaborating in the archaeological excavations of Winchester in England. Work will continue this summer on the 10th Century Anglo-Saxon Cathedral which revealed the original original tomb of St. Swithun of Wolvesey, and a complex of shops, houses and public buildings in Lower Brook Street.

The annual expedition, which runs from July 1 to Sept. 8, 1968, invites any interested college students or faculty to apply. Both men and women over eighteen are eligible, and previous experience is not necessary.

Good physical condition is a prerequisite to joining the group, as work goes on, rain or shine, six or seven days a week, ten or more hours a day. Apparently the satisfactions of unearthing a new relic, and working and living with students from sixteen different nations outweigh the hardships, however, as many students have returned year after year.

The student diggers receive free accommodation in Winchester, free breakfast and supper at camp, and a modest lunch allowance. Medical and dental services are available to workers under National Health.

Travelling expenses are the responsibility of the applicant, and New York-to-London round trip fares are about \$300.

Reference Books for the library were acquired from the Book Exchange and students have contributed used Monarch outlines.

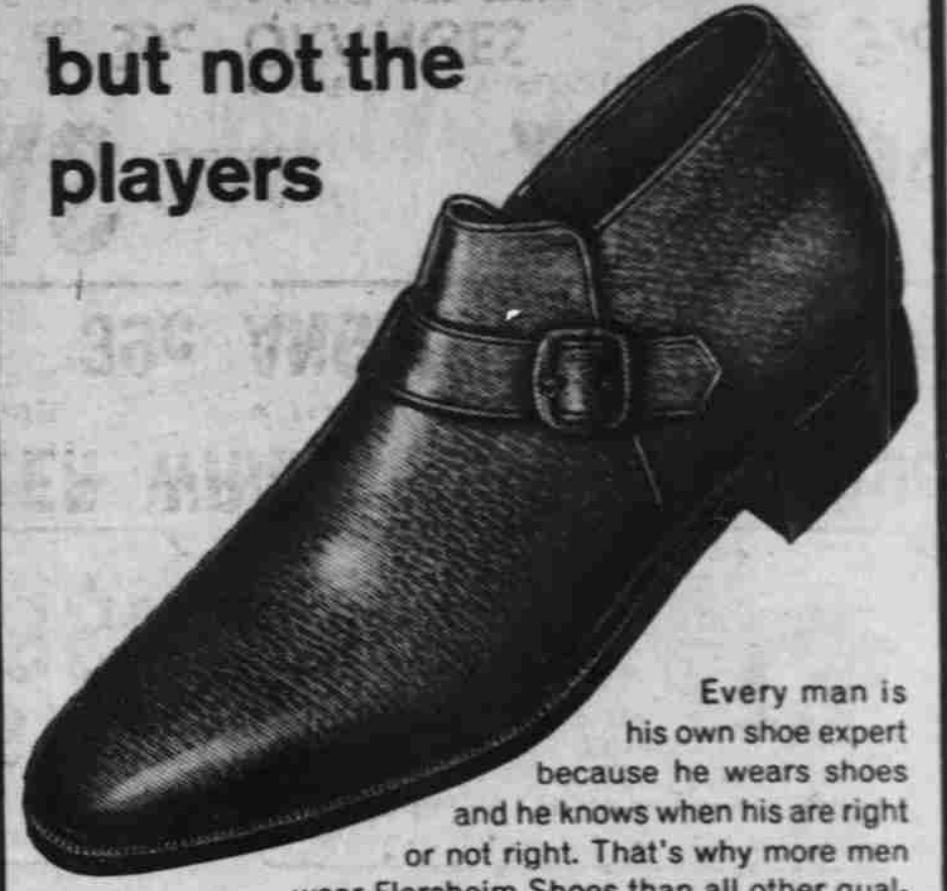
A dictionary publisher contributed a number of dictionaries to the library.
