Ohio Edges UNC Golfers

By ART CHENSKY (of The Daily Tar Heel Staff) The UNC Golf team, despite a strong comeback, lost its initial match of the season yesterday to a strong Ohio University team, 9 1-2-11 1-2, at Finley Golf Course.

Strong performances were turned in by Carolina's Glenn Staropoli and Bill Brackett who both won 3 points while shutting out Ohio's Dave Deber and Greg Moore, respectively.

Hampered by gusty winds and early season nervousness, each team played well below its capability.

A not too disappointed Coach Ed Kenney said his team "played badly and got beaten. It's as simple as that."

"This was our first match and we were nervous," said Staropoli, who played well enough to win but still not at mid season form. "Now that we've got this first match under our belts, we should give a much stronger performance from here on in."

The Tar Heels started slowly and were down 5-2 after the first nine holes with only Staropoli and Brackett winning on the front side. But Jim Hickman came back strong to win the backside and his

overall match. Charlie Lynch hauled the backside of his match to bring the Tar Heels just short of a tie.

Two Wrestlers Will Compete In Nationals

Two University of North Carolina wrestlers will compete in the NCAA Championships beginning Thursday at Penn State.

Fred Priester, a 177 pounder from Davenport, Iowa, will compete along with Luther Gartrell, a 145-pound freshman from Asheville, Ala.

Priester, runnerup in the Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament for the past three seasons, finished the year with a 9-4 individual mark. He was co-captain of the UNC team.

Gartrell, wrestling most of the regular season at 152 pounds, had a 3-1 individual mark and a fourth place finish in the tough Atlanta Invitational Meet.

"Both boys stand a good chance of finishing well in the Nationals," Head Coach Sam Barnes said. "Over 300 wrestlers are expected this year and the competition will be tough, but with a little luck both Priester and Gartrell will make a good showing."

Carolina Defense Shines

UNC Stickmen Blast Adelphi, 9-4

By RICK BREWER (of The Daily Tar Heel Staff) Jumping out to a quick 3-0 lead in the opening period, North Carolina's lacrosse team won its season lidlifter from Adelphi 9-4 on Fetzer Field Monday.

The Heels tallied four times in the second stanza to hold a commanding 7-0 advantage at halftime. That lead grew to 9-0 before the Panthers finally were able to score against a tough Carolina defense.

Only 3:32 had elapsed in the game before the UNC stickmen had their first goal of the campaign. Senior Bill Bicksler got the score with an assist from Harper Peterson. With 12:35 gone, Peter Atkin scored unassisted. The final Carolina goal of the period came off the stick of Jeff Perry, with an assist from Pete Grauer.

Two consecutive goals by Peterson in the second stanza shot UNC to a commanding 5-0 lead. John Callan had assists on both of Peterson's goals.

At 8:32 of the period, Grauer went in for an unassisted tally. Ray Seipe added the final Tar Heel goal of the first half with 9:06 expired.

The big reason for Adelphi's inability to score in the first half was the outstanding play of the Carolina defense. Duke Kermin, John McCorkle, and Temple Grassi did excellent jobs in stopping the Panther attack.

It took UNC only 0:52 to score after intermission. Atkin got the goal with Peterson assisting. Peterson set up Carolina's final tally which was scored by Ken Reese. That came at 4:53 of the third

quarter. Adelphi finally put the ball in the net at 5:59 of the period when Bob Macaluso set up Larry Karowski for a score. The same two Panthers teamed up for the second Adelphi goal at 1:13 of the fourth quarter.

Macalusi picked up the final two scores for the visitors, one on an assist from Ken Reese and the other unassisted.

Sophomore Peter Kramer did a good job in the nets for Carolina, coming up with 12 saves. Adelphi goalkeeper Bill Powers was credited with 10 saves.

Tar Heels Fall, 2-1, In Baseball Opener

Baecht smacked a clean single to center field in the ninth inning to drive in the winning run and defeat Carolina in its season's opener here, 2-1.

The Tar Heels were handcuffed by the New York righthander who allowed only four hits in his nine-inning stint.

Baecht struck out six en route to his first victory of the season.

The loss was charged to relief pitcher David Lemonds, now 0-1. Lemonds, who came in for starter Tom Buskey in the sixth inning, was touched for four hits and one run.

He struck out five in his first two innings, but was plagued by occasional lack of control.

Neither team was strong at the plate. Adelphi got only six

hits, three of which never left the infield.

Buskey gave up only two hits and an unearned run in his five frames. Coach Walter Rabb planned before gametime to pull him early because of poor practice weather.

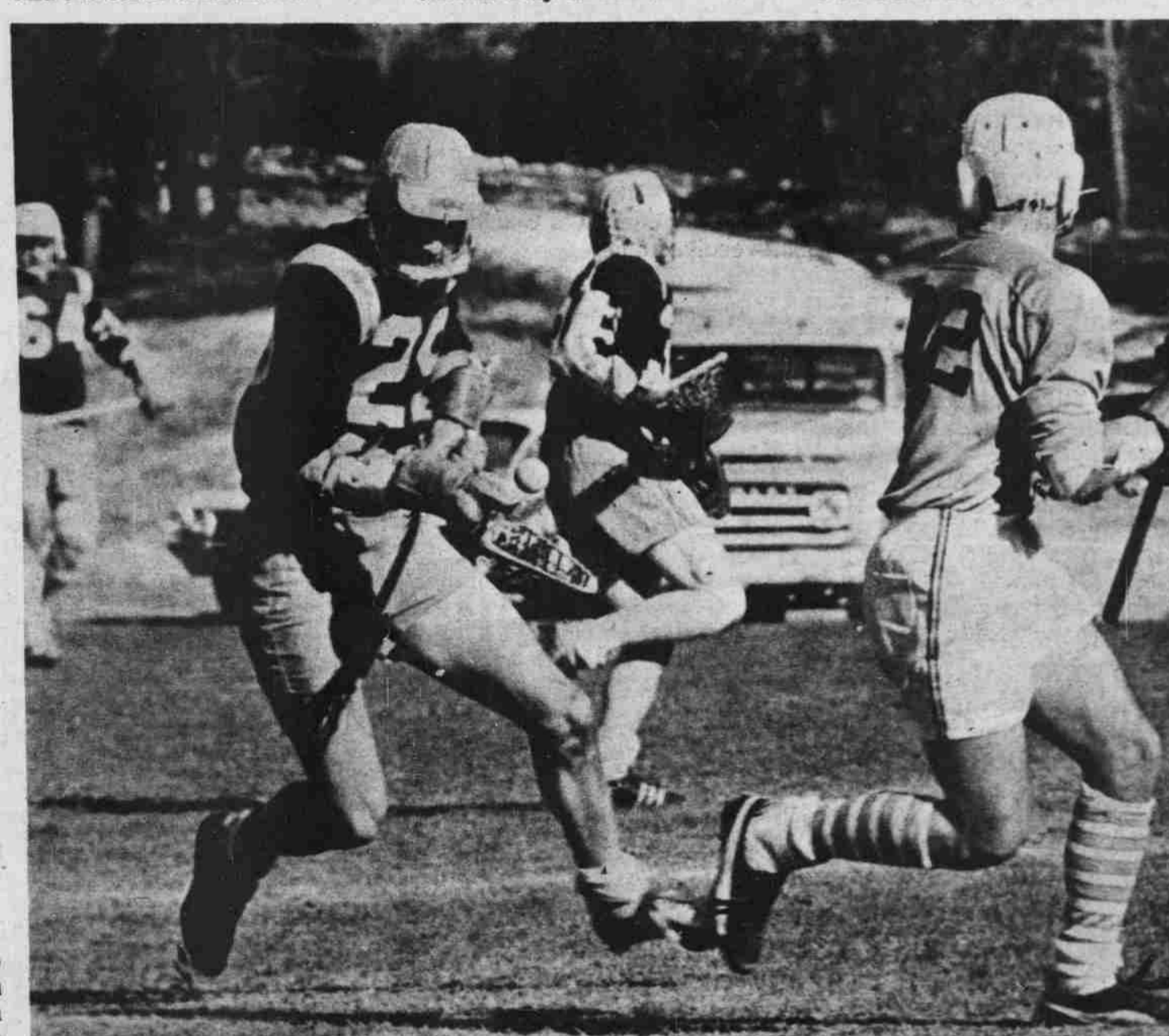
On a pressure-packed 3-2 pitch, the sophomore southpaw struck out catcher Russ Huber, but Baecht then singled for the clincher.

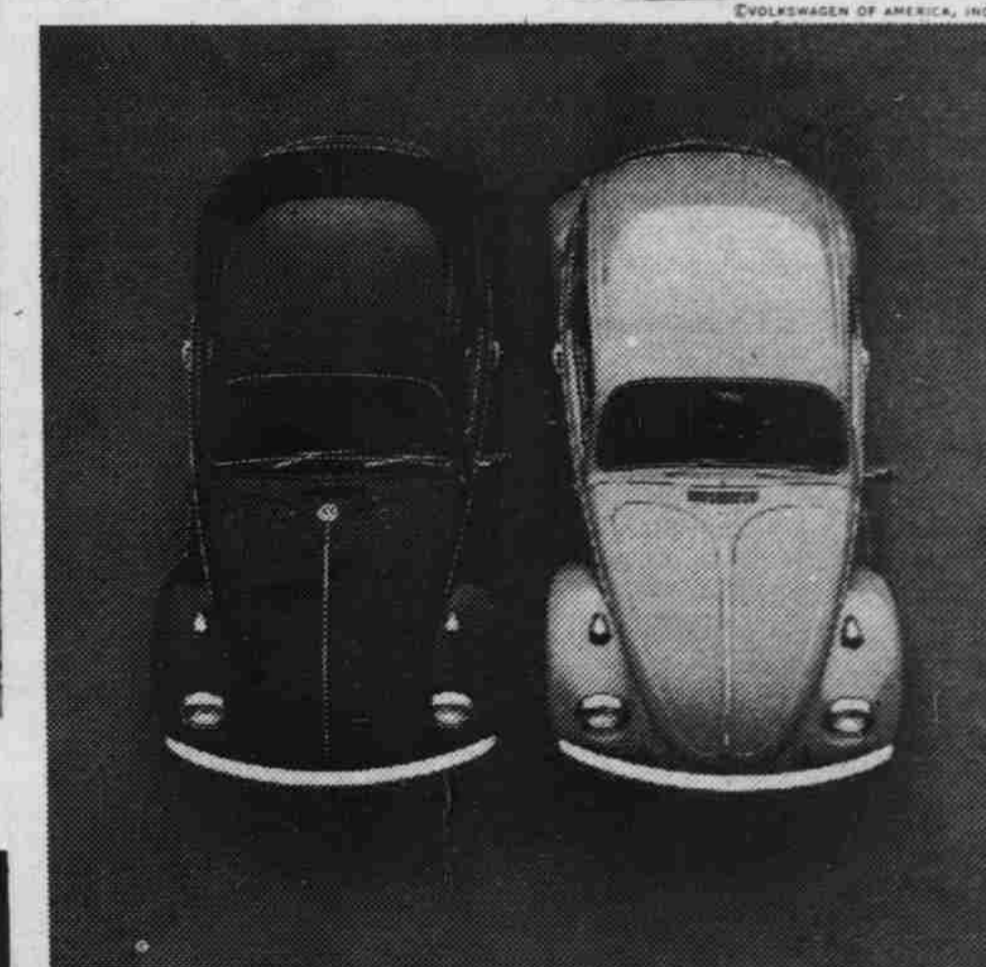


Free-wheeling UNC lacrosse players ... move the ball up in yesterday's win over Adelphi
