Their first win, against Duke, started out to be an easy rout with eight straight wins in the first eight bouts. The Heels then lost their momentum and managed only to squeak by with a 15-12 victory. Although they never tied, the Devils did cut the lead to as few as two

The deciding bout came in the final series of epee when Ben Brinsome nipped Barber of Duke by a 5-4 score.

Individual weapon scores were: sabre, 5-4; epee, 6-3; foil, 4-5. This was the first defeat of the year for the foilsmen.

The four outstanding performers were Bo McBee, 2-1; Bud Griscome, 2-1; Denver Haynes, 2-1; and Chad Hilton,


All three weapons turned in excellent performances as the foilsmen regained their strength and combined with the other two weapons for three scores of 8-1.
