Court Order Freezes Funds; Case Will Be Heard Today

William Robert Bartel (MD-VII), Virginia Branch Barte. (WD-VII), Grady Woodfin Ballenger (MD-II), Mary Grazier Dickson (WD-II), and William Brewster Conn (MD-IX).

Named as having been apointed at the session is David Rooks of Men's District

The complaint challenges the validity of the resignations and the appointment of Rooks and says the legislature should be declared invalid, if it is found that a quorum was not present.

The complaint also charges that Rooks is not a resident of the district which he was appointed to represent Waddell

said Wednesday that although funds were frozen by the injunction he is "unsure that the Supreme Court has the power to freeze funds."

The session of the court this afternoon, Benton said, was called to rule on the case as quickly as possible.

"The court is meeting as soon as possible," Benton said, "to avoid a confrontation between the two branches of Student Government, the legislative and the judicial."

There were rumors early Wednesday that the Student Legislature would meet tonight whether the court moved to grantinjunction relief or not.

Benton's injunction forbade any session of the legislature under penalty of contempt of court.

If the court does declare the special session null and void, the legislature would be free to re-enact the legislation passed during the summer.

That legislation included \$16,000 in oudget cuts from the 1970-71 budget and \$20,000 appropriation establishing Carolina Graphics, a student-owned print

shop which would print the Daily Tar Heel and do job printing for students.

Profits from the shop would go to the students in the form of additions to the Student Government budget.

At present, the print shop is enjoined from doing any printing other than that done for The Daily Tar Heel.




