The impossible has happened. For the first time in memory, no one is complaining violently about registration.

There were the usual problems of long lines (all the way to the Institute of Government) and closed courses.

Nevertheless, students were heard saying orientation was handled efficiently, the staff was courteous and even nice and professors were helpful. Even freshmen and transfer students seemed to know what courses to sign up for.

There were widespread complaints about courses that had filled up before many hopefuls could sign up for them. An art major and a sociology major were

## University Bus System Begins Operation Today

The University bus system will begin today its third year of bus service between South Campus and Wilson Library.

Buses will also connect South Campus and Victory and Odum Villages with the town. Bailey Cobbs, student transportation commissioner, said Wednesday.

All buses will require the exact 10 cents fare and drivers will not make change. "In doing so," Cobbs said, "we

are cooperating with the bus drivers' union and the bus company management in helping to lessen the chance of robbery and also help make service faster."

Buses and drivers are supplied by the Raleigh City Coach Lines company. The University Bus System is operated and maintained by the Student Transportation Committee of student government in cooperation with the University Traffic Safety Committee.

Mondays through Fridays, buses will run between James Dorm and Wilson Library every five minutes from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. From 4:30 p.m. to 5 p.m., the buses will run at 10-minute intervals.

Buses will leave James for town at 15 minutes past each hour from noon until 5 p.m. They will go through Victory and Odum Villages about 20 minutes past the hour and will go down Manning Drive each trip. From 5 until 11:30 p.m., buses will go from James to town via Wilson every 15 minutes.

## Student Protection Service Underway

The Consumer Protection Service (CPS), a new division of the Executive Branch of Student Government, is ready to begin its duties of "making capitalism work for students" this fall, according to its head, Karl Stauber.

Stauber announced Wednesday the complaint service, established in June, will accept calls from students dissatisfied with local merchants, landlords or university community members.

"We will use any capitalistic maneuver necessary," Stauber said in June, "to meet the needs of the people we are trying to serve."

One aim of CPS is to work for a more realistic cost of living in the Chapel Hill area. It will attempt to help individuals "win in the frustrating game of living and

going to school in Chapel Hill," according to Stauber.

Student Body President Tom Bello, alarmed over the current housing crisis plaguing the university, said one major role of CPS this fall will be to "keep a close eye on landlords."

"The service will be in keeping with our Student Government motto of 'Inform, Serve and Protect' this year," said Bello.

Stauber called upon the student body to help staff the service in areas of research, investigation, complaint action and programs development. Anyone interested in working may apply at the Student Union, Room 208-Suite C on Sept. 24 at 3 p.m.
