

Switchboard gets many calls from people threatening suicide or calls dealing with drug overdoses, with which the three people on duty must deal.

When a call comes in to Switchboard, the workers try to establish a relationship with the caller. Workers prefer personal contacts, so one Switchboard helper usually will talk to the caller on the phone while another goes to meet the caller face-to-face.

This resolution of crises is what Swtichboard is all about, according to worker Duane Rominger. "We're not into real rehabilitation, but deal mainly with youth problems," Rominger said.

Chief Blake admitted high school kids "appreciate our films and programs on drugs, but they feel our programs are 'Mickey Mouse.' Those kids want to hear

it from someone who has had experience in drug situations, and Switchboard people have," Chief Blake added.

About high school drug programs, worker Rominger said, "We don't tell pros or cons-we just tell straight facts as we see them. Facts can shake people up as much as scare campaigns," he added.

YDC Meeting Slated Tonight

"Campaign 70" will be the feature of tonight's meeting of the Young Democratic Club (YDC) at 8 p.m. in the Student Union.

"We are seeking people interested in working in the state congressional campaigns this fall," said Butch Rooks. undergraduate vice-chairman of the local

The club also will hold a discussion about efforts to preserve Bald Head Island. The island, at the mouth of the Cape Fear Fiver, has been the object of a battle between private developers and conservationists.

Speaking about the upcoming election, Rooks said, "We have found at least three candidates who are reasonably close to the students."

The three are incumbent Democratic Reps. Nick Galifianakis of the Fourth District and Richardson Preyer of the Sixth District and Cliff Blue, who is challenging Republican Rep. Earl Ruth for the Eighth District Seat.

Rooks said the local YDC plans to hold a rally here for Galifianakis Oct. 9. "The problem in North Carolina is that there aren't that many peace candidates. These come the closest to representing the view of the students," said Rooks. "Cliff Blue, for instnace, has been against the war for five years."

Rooks stressed that his organization welcomes anyone interested in working in the campaign regardless of his candidate preference.

"We have contacted several candidates. Most have shown interest in having students work for them," said Rooks.

The YDC plans to finance its election campaign through membership fees, which are \$1 per year for each member. "We hope to increase the membership this year," said Rooks, who added that a

the local YDC chapter last spring. "There is a lot which an individual can do to help in the campaign," said Rooks. 'We need people to make telephone calls and work with the registration lists.
