International Cultures Meet Floor A Melting Pot

A microcosm of world culture is flourishing on the second floor of Winston dormitory, the women's International Floor.

The International Floor, considered part of the International Student Center which is located in Carr dormitory, contains 23 foreign and 16 American students.

The floor was moved this year to Winston from Connor dormitory to include foreign graduate women and to take advantage of kitchen facilities.

While the foreign students receive invaluable aid in adjusting to life in the United States, the girls from the United States have the unique experience of simultaneously sampling many cultures.

According to sophomore Mary Ann Warrick, president of the floor, the International Floor is trying to get

foreign women involved in life here. "I think you have to do it on a person-to-person basis," she added.

Most foreign women at Chapel Hill are from the Far East and consequently have more difficulty adjusting than would a Westerner.

In the past, many students have had an unhappy life in the States. They have met no Americans and have had no help in adjusting to a totally different culture. Many can't get accustomed to American food.

The International Floor tries to alleviate this situation. As one foreign grad student explained, "(On the I-Floor) we're not so much in the minority."

Most of the foreign students have an American roommate, although a shortage of American residents prevents this from being totally possible.

Much activity revolves around the kitchen in the middle of the floor, where Oriental and Occidental meals are

prepared to the tune of multi-lingual conversations.

The kitchen facilities help solve at least some of the food problem, although it is overcrowded. It does enable many of the girls to cook foods with which they are familiar, however.

Most of the women are graduate students on special programs, many of them in public health. For example, AID, World Health Organization and the National Science Foundation all sponsor students from other countries, enabling them to study in this country.

Often they come to the States for only a year of special studies before returning home.

The International Floor can thus be invaluable in making the terrific adjustment of that one year easier and more enjoyable. Vacancies are anticipated after this semester and interested students will thereby have an opportunity to move into the Center in the spring.

Classes End At 11 A.M. On Monday

Classes will end Monday at 11 a.m. so that students can attend ceremonies under the Davie Poplar marking University Day.

This is the celebration of the "birthday of the University." The Carolina Playmakers will re-enact the laying of the cornerstone of Old East, the oldest state university building in the United States.

The scene is set for Oct. 12, 1793. It was then that Gen. William Richardson Davie, "the Father of the University of North Carolina," laid the original cornerstone of Old East. The building is now a national shrine.

A Princeton University graduate, Davie settled in Halifax County, N.C. In 1776, he pushed for a clause in the North Carolina constitution authorizing the establishment of "one or more universities."

Gen. Davie later headed a legislative and trustee committee that founded the University at Chapel Hill. The first students were admitted in 1795.

Provost J. C. Morrow is in charge of the event. Chancellor J. Carlyle Sitterson will preside. The invocation will be delivered by Chancellor Emeritus Robert B. House.

Pageant narrator will be Prof. Earl Wynn. Directing will be Irene S. Rains.

Gen. Davie will be portrayed by drama student James Challenger. Others taking part are Thomas Cherry and Kestal Phillips.

Music will be provided by the UNC Band, directed by Major John Yesulaitis, and Prof. Robert Porco's Men's Glee Club.

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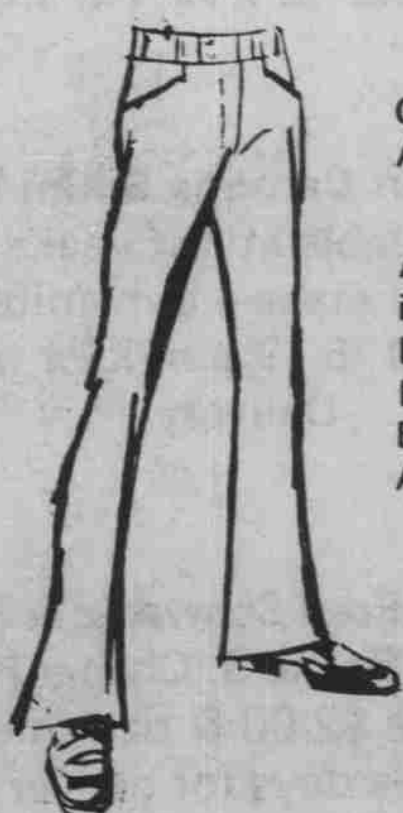

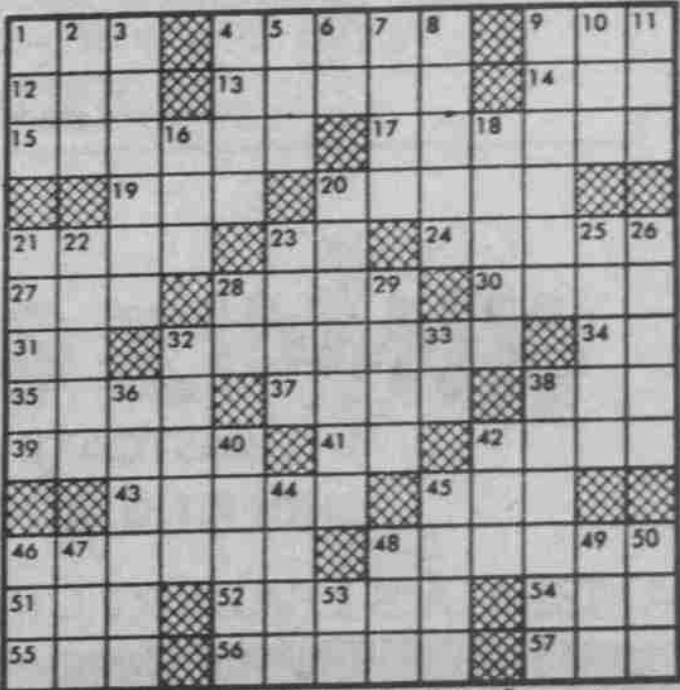
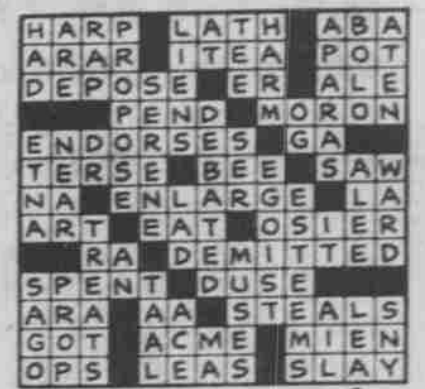
