

Nixon-Try 'New Road'

UNITED NATIONS - President Nixon invited leaders of the Soviet Union Friday to join him in building a "new road" to peace by ending the arms race and competing instead in leading the world to economic and social progress.

"In this kind of competition," Nixon said, "no one loses and everyone benefits." Nixon issued his appeal in a speech to the 25th anniversary session of the General Assembly of the United Nations. It is his second speech before the world organization since becoming president.

"Joe"-A satire on the hard-hat mentality that drew raves from the critics. -G



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
