

Heel nine at VPI; netters face Miami

Hard-hitting Gobblers boast .325 plate mark

Carolina certainly has its work cut out when the Tar Heels pull into Blacksburg, Va. this afternoon to take on the Gobblers of Virginia Tech.

The Techmen, who through the first 14 have an outstanding 9-5 record, have managed to compile an awesome team batting average of .325. The Big Five power has battered opposing hurlers or 147 hits in their 14 games and have four batters batting over .400.

What more can you say about Tech's hitting except the team's leader, catcher John Van Arnhem, is batting an astronomical .538? As if this wasn't enough to make the opposing pitcher shake, the Brookpark, Ohio native also has 20 RBI's and 3 homers to his credit.

Following close behind Van Arnhem, there's shortstop Jay Fleischer, with a .458 average, first baseman Billy Tanner, batting .421, and infielder Vince Carbaugh, batting .400.

For the Gobblers, the probable starter will be sophomore Berky Cundiff.

For the Tar Heels hard throwing Greg Pavlick, who hasn't seen action in several games, has been mentioned by Coach Rabb as a possible starter. The righthander turned in his best performance of the year when Carolina downed State 7-4 in the season's opener.

Freshman Jim Chamberlain, who will be looking to bounce back from his disappointing start against State last Wednesday, has also been mentioned as a possible starter, as has John Beard and Bill Wardle.

Club on road

State took the opening game of the North Carolina Club Football Association season by posting a surprising 36-0 win over Carolina last week.

The Wolfpack team took the opening kickoff and scored in a nine-minute drive, then recovered a fumble and scored again.

Although the Tar Heel club failed to score, the team showed some considerable but inconsistent potential. It penetrated inside State's 20 yard line on four occasions including a march to the visitors' five-yard-line at the end of the first half.

The Chapel Hill team gets an opportunity for revenge this morning at 10:00 when they visit the State campus for a rematch.

The Tar Heel trackmen face an improving South Carolina team today on Fetzer Field at 1:30. Carolina defeated the Gamecocks by only two points last year and USC has shored up some weak spots since then.

Also slated for this afternoon is a lacrosse game between Carolina and Fairleigh-Dickinson University. That contest will get under way at 2 on Navy Field.

The stickmen, who have lost their last three games, have drawn another tough opponent in the touring New Jersey team. Fairleigh is undefeated, with its victories coming over Renneslear Polytech, Plymouth State, Washington, and most recently, a 10-2 victory over Duke last Thursday in Durham.

Other Fairleigh standouts include senior attackman Dennis Dawson, and Greg Kresh, both of whom were All-Division last year, and All-American

defenseman John Salvenson. The Tar Heels will be going with their usual lineup, but Anania promises "something new" to boost Carolina's attack.

The best events in today's track meet should be the 880 run, where Carolina freshman Tony Waldrop will face two-time ACC champion Bob Kazcka, and the sprints, with the Gamecock duo of Jim Small and Keith Eidson facing the Tar Heels' Hubert West, Hank Snowden and Mike Canzonieri.

Dick Harris in the 440 and Billy Novo in the hurdles are two of USC's best.

For the Tar Heels, two-miler Larry Widgeon has been running well lately, and shot putter John Jessup should be favored over the Cocks' Forrest Broom, a junior college transfer.

Charlie Ball has been consistent in the high jump in relief of injured ace Dave Hilliard.

Coach Joe Hilton considers the meet "one of the closest of the season for us. Both Clemson and South Carolina have better programs now than last year."

Year's toughest match insured

The tough Tar Heels of Coach Don Skakle put their highly successful season on the line again today against their toughest competition of the season. The Heels, now 12-1, will battle the University of Miami Hurricanes down in southern Florida.

The Carolina netters will have to give their best performance of the year if there is to be any hope of an upset victory against the powerful Hurricanes. Miami finished third in the NCAA tourney last year at Salt Lake City behind perennial powers UCLA and Southern California. The top Hurricane doubles team of Pat Kramer and Luis Garcia took the national title.

The only mutual opposition the two teams have faced this year is the Clemson Tigers. The Heels dropped a heartbreaker to Clemson 5-4 while Miami took the Tigers 6-3 and 7-2 on consecutive down in Miami. Miami is now 12-0 for the year.

On the first court Skakle will send Freddie McNair, who is recuperating from a virus, against Mexican Davis Cup star Luis Garcia. Both McNair and Garcia are consensus All-Americans so the match might be considered a toss up.

Junior Jimmy Corn will hold down the number two spot for the Heels. Corn, who is undefeated this season, will be battling Eddy Dibbs, who was Florida state high school champion a couple of years ago. The Shelby native will have to rely on his steady ground strokes and amazing consistency to overcome the power of Dibbs.

At number three strong-man sophomore Forrest Simmons will be going after one of the biggest wins of his Carolina career. The big Tennessee will

be playing Raz Reid, who was the state high school champion in South Carolina before UNC's Richard Hardaway took over the title.

Skakle is very optimistic about Carolina's chances on the fourth and fifth courts. He is sending freshman Richard McKee, who is undefeated as a Tar Heel, against Joe Globish at number four.

Number five man Richard Hardaway will be playing Joe Bouquin. Hardaway's lone loss of the season came last week in a tough three setter to Sarifaz Rahim of Clemson.

Rounding out the six singles entries Mike Kernodle will be hitting with Tom Hauser. Some consider Hauser to be the best sixth man in the country. He should

provide a stern test for the power game of Kernodle.

In the doubles action, which hopefully will decide the outcome of the match, Skakle will send his usual entries against the three Hurricane tandems. McNair and McKee will play Garcia and Dibbs. A win here for the Heels would be very helpful toward a high seeding in the nationals.

At number two Corn and Hardaway go after Reid and Globish in what could be the deciding contest. On the last court Simmons and frosh Joe Garcia, no relation to Luis, will be playing Bouquin and Hauser.

For the first time in quite a while the Tar Heels will be the underdogs. A win here would be a great stepping stone to the nationals to be held at Notre Dame in June.
