
Buffet brings people together

The posters say, "Battle House Buffet Lives!" And, every Wednesday from 11:30-2:00, the Battle House Buffet thrives. Sponsored by the Campus Chaplains' Association, the Buffet is a noon-time meal prepared and served by the campus chaplains on a rotating basis. The place is Battle House, the Baptist Student Center, tucked behind Kenan Dorm on Battle Lane.

At the beginning of the fall semester, the campus chaplains, led by Bob Clyde, former Baptist chaplain, Lex Matthews, Episcopal chaplain, and Norman Gustavason, Y Director, discussed the need for a place for food and conversation. "With the passing of Lenoir Cafeteria, the campus lost an informal place for students and faculty to talk over lunch," said Gustavason. "Thus, the campus is now more fragmented ... It's harder to get together."

Recognizing the void left by the closing of the cafeteria, the campus chaplains set about to provide an informal eating place, a place where faculty and students in the University



community, could come together for a casual inexpensive lunch. What contributes to the success of the Buffet? Six boys from Graham Dorm answered, "The food is good, inexpensive, and Battle House is near the dorm." One said, "It's the best deal for a lunch in Chapel Hill." "I mean, where else can you make sandwiches with pumpernickel bread?" Jim Strader wanted to know. Moreover, there is a "relaxing atmosphere so you can digest your food better." "If you like strawberry shortcake, big Dagwood sandwiches, quiet music, and all you want to eat, you'd eat here every Wednesday too."

"It adds something very positive to the University, a very coming-together

climate. There is a definite need for this type of operation here," commented Stan Hall, campus Lutheran chaplain. "Besides, it's a good chance to meet someone you know that you don't usually see in the daily round."

Not only does Hall like the food, but the Buffet helps him in his work by providing more chance to share and cooperate with the other chaplains.

"Furthermore," John Meeker, Morehead Residence College Chaplain pointed out, "Battle House is a good place to meet and eat, and then to go upstairs and work on committee projects. He and his colleagues planned to do just that after lunch. "Not many people


realize the extent of the Buffet ... What a great place to eat and then retreat to the quiet study rooms above!"

About forty to sixty people come to the Battle House Buffet every Wednesday. Keith Latchworth of the Baptist Student Union thinks the crowds have been growing. Jazz bands playing in N.C. festival




