

SL's power: dispersing money

The most powerful Student Government body is an elected group of 39 men and 18 women whose main function is dispersing about \$260,000 in Student Activity Fees: the Student Legislature (SL).

Other functions of the body are:
—setting judicial policies;
—creating a forum for student opinion;
—maintaining an administrative responsibility over student courts; and
—confirming presidential appointments.

But these tasks are overshadowed by SL's role in the dispersal of the Student Activity Fees.
Each student pays a required \$18 fee

included in tuition costs annually. The fees are collected by the University and put into a trust fund.

SL appropriates the money to various student organizations which requisition the funds through the Student Activity Fund Office located in the Student Union. Upon requisition the money is transferred from the trust fund to the student organization.

The body will be led by Chris Daggett, who as vice president of the student body holds the post of SL speaker.

"I think our primary task this year is to make legislators more responsive to the needs of the students," Daggett said. "Making legislators responsive to the students' instead of responsive to the position is of utmost importance."

SL meets every Thursday night at 7:30

p.m. at the Di-Phi Chambers in New West Building.

Five committees made up of members from the Legislature are appointed annually to handle certain legislative business.

The Ways and Means Committee considers appointments by the student body president and listens to all reports due SL from outside organizations.

The Rules Committee considers all bills pertaining to SL by-laws, Student Government by-laws and campus election rules.

The Finance Committee handles all financial bills and draws up the annual budget.

An Ethics Committee was established last year "to consider and report all measures relating to the conduct of

student officials and petitions to expel or impeach" officers.

The chairmen of the committees for 1971-72 will be Kathy McGuire, chairman of the Ways and Means Committee; Robert Grady, chairman of the Finance Committee; Marjorie Spruill, chairman of the Judicial Committee; Gerry Cohen, chairman of the Rules Committee and Jake Alexander, chairman of the Ethics Committee.

Charles Gilliam, a legislator, defined SL as "the supreme legislative power" on campus.

"It is just like any other legislative body," he said. "In theory, it is the exact same thing as the United States Congress. It even levies taxes in the form of Student Activity Fees."

Gilliam said last year's important legislative issues were the establishment of a student print shop, a report on judicial reform of the student court system (in the form of a recommendation) and the enactment of new by-laws for SL.

"It is too soon to tell what the big issues are going to be this year," Gilliam said. "I think the separation of the Graduate and Professional Student Federation from the recognized Student Legislature and the transfer of student fees into a trust account will be topics of concern for SL."

A proposed graduate student government failed to gain recognition from Chancellor J. Carlyle Sitterson this summer although efforts are continuing by graduates. The student fees controversy arose last spring when the University announced all fees would be placed in a trust fund instead of the Student Activity Fund Office account.

Gilliam described SL as a protective body as well as a legislative body. He said SL is a student voice in matters with the administration and trustees.

"We would like it very much if more students come to our meetings," he said. "There is a lot of technical business that most students would not be interested in, but there are a lot of important bills also that should draw the concern of the student body."

Pub Board directed by Charles Gilliam

One student, the chairman of the Publications Board, has financial and business control over the Daily Tar Heel, The Carolina Quarterly, WCAR campus radio station, Yackety-Yack yearbook and Student Graphics print shop. He is Charles Gilliam, a senior from Plymouth.

"The Publications Board is concerned strictly with the business interests of those organizations," emphasized Gilliam. "We function strictly and totally from a business standpoint."

The duty of the Publications Board is to "insure that fair, honest and ethical business and financial practices are maintained and to insure that the good name of Student Government and this University are maintained," according to Gilliam.

The student-faculty board of directors also establishes rules and regulations to aid the heads of the publications in operating efficiency.

The Publications Board, under Gilliam, will be looking into the standard operating procedures of the publications and revising both functions and procedures.

Student Graphics was set up last fall to serve as a print shop for Student Government organizations and the Daily Tar Heel.

As chairman of the Publications Board, Gilliam serves as president of the corporation.

The Publications Board supervised the changing of the Yackety-Yack from a student fee basis to a subscription basis. In the past, students paid for their Yack from their activities fee paid with tuition. The Yack will operate this year on a \$10,000 appropriation from Student Legislature (SL) and a \$6 subscription fee.

"It would be impossible for the Yack to survive if it didn't receive the Student Legislature appropriation," Gilliam

commented. "I think \$10,000 is a good figure."

"This will be an experimental year for the Yack," he added, "but we all have high hopes for it."

The 1970-71 yearbook will be distributed in early September to students who were enrolled last year.

In addition to its supervisory duties, the Publications Board appoints the editor and business manager of the Daily Tar Heel, the editor of the summer Tar Heel, station and business managers of WCAR, the editor and business manager of the Carolina Quarterly and general manager of Student Graphics.

Blanket approval is usually given to the staffs selected by those organization heads.

The Publications Board is composed of two faculty members appointed by the chancellor, three students appointed by the student body president, two appointed by and from the Student Legislature and one by and from the Finance Committee of SL.
