Golden Fleece tapping tonight

William D. Snider, editor of "The Greensboro Daily News," will address new and old members of the Order of the Golden Fleece during tapping ceremonies at 8 p.m. today in Gerrard Hall.

This is the first year women will be tapped into the order, which is UNC's highest honorary society.

The Golden Fleece tapping and Snider's speech are open to the public.

Snider, a prize-winning editorial writer, has served as treasurer, vice president and president of the National Conference of Editorial Writers. He has been president of the UNC Alumni Association and a member of the UNC Press Board of Governors and the Chancellor's Selection Committee.

A 1941 UNC graduate, Snider served as reporter, associate editor and editorial writer for "The Daily Tar Heel." He

worked for the "Salisbury Post" in his hometown and for the N.C. State Highway and Public Works commissions.

Snider joined "The Greensboro Daily News" staff in 1951 and became editor in 1965, after serving as associate editor for 14 years.

Founded in 1903, the Order of the Golden Fleece is among the nation's oldest collegiate honoraries. Members of the junior and senior classes, faculty and members of the community with "the highest qualifications in character, ability, achievement and leadership" are selected.

Taylor to print Yack in 1973

The Publications Board voted unanimously Wednesday to award the contract for printing the 1973 Yackety Yack to Taylor Publishing Co. of Dallas, Tex.

Taylor printed the 1967 and 1968 Yack. Since then the Yack has been published by Hunter Publishing Co. of Winston-Salem.

Taylor is one of the largest publishing companies in the world. It prints more yearbooks than any other domestic company.

Dorm contest to close today

All low rise dorms and high rise floors planning to enter the Outstanding Dorm contest should submit their applications at the Residence College Federation office in Suite C of the Student Union no later than 5 p.m. today.

Mike O'Neal, Men's Residence Council (MRC) chairman, said "The competition is still wide open to date since we have received only four applications so far."

Any dorm or floor that did not receive an application may pick one up anytime today in the RCF office and will be granted a one day grace period in which to turn in their presentation.

The competition for outstanding dorm, which is being sponsored by the MRC, will name two winners among

men's dorms. One award will be made for the outstanding low rise dormitory and the other award will go to the outstanding high rise floor.

Final selection of the winners will be made Tuesday at 8:30 p.m. in the Union. All entrants are invited to come and present a short verbal summary of their unit's accomplishments.

The presentation must be in written form and cover only the period between September 1, 1971 and April 14, 1972.

Tripodi backers to meet tonight

An organizational meeting of "Students For Tripodi" will be held tonight at 7 in room 215 of the Student Union.

The purpose of the meeting will be to instigate Pete Tripodi's campus campaign for the 17th District N.C. House seat.

Mark Stephenson, organizational chairman, said the basic purpose of Tripodi's campaign is to give interested students a chance to get involved in a House race.

"We want to provide a place for students to work who would not be welcome in more formal organizations," Stephenson added. "This organization will be able to get students involved in politics more easily. It is an easy way to start out in the field of political campaigns."

Tripodi is one of seven candidates running in the Democratic primary for the two seats now held by Ike Andrews and Carl Smith.

Fund control asked by Scott College

The senate of Scott Residence College passed by unanimous vote Tuesday a resolution stating that the funds from the \$2 "special equipment fund" surcharge added to dorm rent rates should be put entirely under control of the residence colleges.

The special equipment fund was originally proposed by the University business office, under the direction of Assistant Vice Chancellor John Temple and supported by Director of Residence Life Robert Kepner, the Residence College Federation and the Committee on University Residence Life (CURL).

The \$2 surcharge will start next fall, with the resulting funds, about \$25,000 over both semesters, under the direction of Residence Life. Under current proposals, \$15,000 of the fund would be used to support the Morrison-Morehead Counseling Teams.

According to the plan in the Scott resolution, the money would be placed in a "special projects, equipment and physical improvement trust fund, to be held through the Student Activities Fund Office."

"The \$2 per resident per semester," states the resolution, "shall be allocated to each residence unit and/or residence college on a proportional basis according to their resident population." This plan should be instituted "as soon as administratively feasible or not later than spring semester 1973."

The resolution was introduced in the Scott senate by Mike O'Neal, president of Avery dorm. "Putting this money under

student control," he said, "will not only be a part of the budget of Residence Life, it is also a part of their operating budget."

Kepner said of the plan, "My initial reaction is this would reduce the effectiveness of the fund. It is better if the administration of this money should be handled centrally, by Residence Life, with recommendations from CURL and the RCF." Residence Life is currently making plans to use the revenue from the fund over both semesters next year.

"Technically, our plan would be introduced next fall," said O'Neal. "Our purpose is not to disrupt the plan of the RCF, or to disrupt funding for counseling teams. In any case, the residence colleges will have the money available under our plan, to use it for such purposes as the counseling team."

"This would leave the residence colleges free to use their social funds for social purposes, as they were intended," he said, "instead of having to use them for physical improvements, as some residence colleges have."

"The purpose of the plan is to recognize that all on-campus students do not have the same needs or goals, and allow more local control over the allocation of this money."

O'Neal said the independent residence hall presidents and residence college governors would be contacted for support concerning the plan, and the resolution would be sent "to the appropriate administration representatives."

He said the Scott senate wanted evidence of popular support for the plan before serious efforts were made to have it accepted. This would mean waiting until next year, he said.

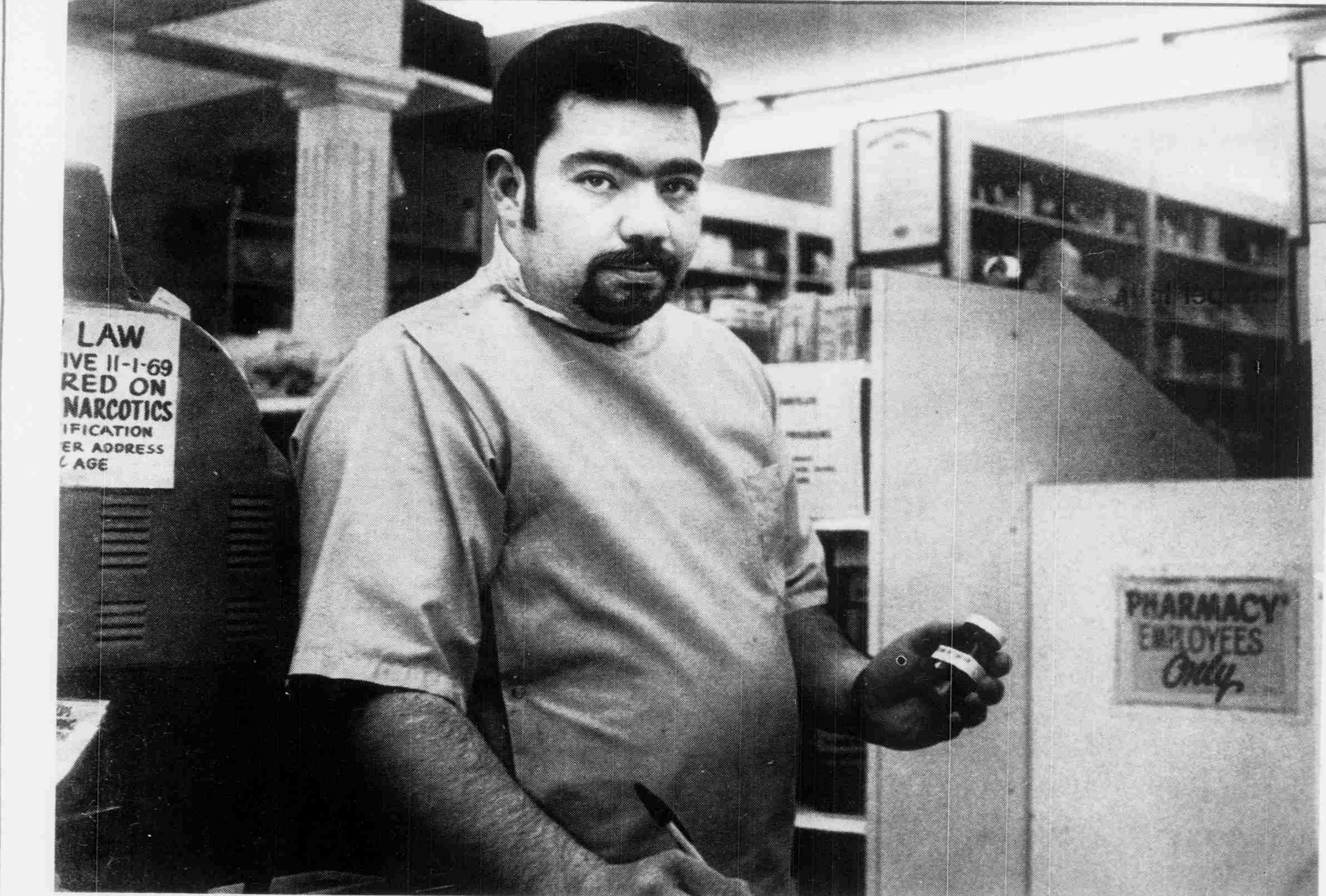
