University to implement course evaluation

The Chancellor's Committee on Instructional Personnel recently passed a resolution providing for course evaluations by students for the 1972-1973 academic year, according to Provost J. Charles Morrow.

Morrow said the University will order educational testing materials from the Educational Testing Service in Princeton, New Jersey, and determine their effectiveness and appropriateness in providing course evaluations.

The form, with which students will make their evaluations of courses, teachers and materials, is called the Student Instructional Report.

Morrow indicated plans concerning the implementation of the course evaluations are experimental and tentative, subject to the cost of individual forms.

Tom Pace, coeditor of a recent course evaluation booklet compiled from a study made by Zeta Beta Tau and Pi Beta Phi last semester, said he definitely favored the action of the committee in implementing some kind of course evaluation procedure although he doubted the serviceability of the individual form.

The evaluation provided general information from the professor and student evaluations.

Dr. John Schutz, chairman of the Faculty Committee on Undergraduate Degree Requirements, also indicated his committee report will offer some recommendations for regular course evaluations by the faculty.

Hunger protest to end Friday

The group fasting in protest of the bombing in Vietnam will end their hunger strike Friday noon at Polk Place by eating

a meal that Vietnamese refugees eat - a bowl of rice.

Everyone is invited to join the hunger strikers and to make any contributions for the Vietnamese children.

According to the U.S. Senate subcommittee on refugees, about one-third of the population of South Vietnam has been made refugees since 1964.

One striker said it is important to realize that the flight of these people from their ancestral villages is not a mere accident of war. It is part of a deliberate U.S. policy, he said.

The group feels the policy of Saigon and Washington illustrates "both the brutality and the absurdity of this war."

The Chapel Hill vigil will be similar to other vigils across the nation.

The Nationwide Moratorium encourages participation in the weekly peace vigil held every Wednesday from noon to 1 p.m. in front of the Post Office.
