Absentee deadline nears

Students who have not yet mailed in their official North Carolina absentee ballot applications should do so immediately.

According to notary public William Hood, who is coordinating Student Government (SG) absentee ballot efforts, "County elections boards which receive the official absentee ballot applications after next Monday (October 30) are not required to act on them until it is too late," Hood said.

Under state law, elections boards in North Carolina can only mail out ballots on Mondays and Fridays. Ballots mailed Friday, November 3, will not reach the voter until after the North Carolina absentee ballot deadline November 4. Most other states have November 6 deadlines.

Hood urged all students to mail their applications by Saturday at the very latest. "Those mailing Friday or Saturday should do so at the Post Office, not in a dorm mail drop," Hood said.

SG's free notary service will continue in the Student Government office in the Student Union weekdays from 2 to 5 p.m. and 7 to 9 p.m., except on Friday night.

There will also be notary service this Saturday from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the SG office.

Little to speak

Erick Little, Republican Congressional candidate from the Second District, will talk to students and answer their questions at noon today in The Pit.

Little will be available all afternoon to discuss issues and his positions with interested persons. He is visiting the campus before beginning a week of intensive campaigning throughout the district.

POW ceremony

The Air Force and Navy ROTC cadets and midshipmen at UNC are extending an invitation to the public to attend the Veterans' Day ceremony at 1 p.m. today to join in prayer for the immediate release of POW's from North Vietnam.

"We hope you will make this year special by coming and praying with us for the immediate release of POW's from North Vietnam and the welfare of veterans who have served our country so nobly," is the joint invitation from Lt.

Col. Wesley W. Egan, USAF, professor of aerospace studies, and Col. R.C. Needham, USMC, professor of naval science here.

Maj. Gen. John A. Lang, USAF (Ret.), secretary for Military Affairs for the State of North Carolina, will receive the ROTC's in review at Fetzer Field, adjacent to Carmichael Auditorium.

Two major awards will be made during the review. Capt. Jimmy E. Hull, USAF, a staff officer of the Air Force ROTC and a UNC alumnus from Thomasville, will receive the Navy Commendation Medal for Meritorious Service while aboard the USS Woodrow Wilson.

'Pan-Africanism'

P.O. Esedebé, an authority on Pan Africanism, will speak today at 8 p.m. in room 202-204 of the Student Union.

The native Nigerian is a visiting scholar at Columbia University and is currently touring the United States as a guest of the American Council on Education.

Esedebé is presently on leave from Fourah Bay College at the University of Sierra Leone, Freetown. He is a lecturer in history there.

He received a Ph.D. in African History from London University in 1968 for a dissertation entitled "A History of the Pan-African Movement in Britain, 1900-1948."

As a Nigerian, Esedebé has gained a first-hand knowledge of Pan-African movements in both Africa and some Western nations. His interpretations of the movement are probably the most widely accepted on the subject.

Esedebé has published several articles dealing with Pan-Africanism in both scholarly journals and the press, including an article published in the Journal of African History entitled, "Abolitionism and the Atlantic Slave Trade, a Review."

NCSL selection

The selection committee for the UNC delegation to the North Carolina Student Legislature (NCSL) will hold interviews for those interested in being NCSL delegates November 1 and 2.

According to Richard Robertson, acting chairman of the committee, the UNC delegation is allowed to send two senators and 13 representatives to the NCSL, which will be held at the Sir Walter Raleigh Hotel in Raleigh March 28

to April 1. The UNC delegation is also allowed alternates for each legislator and as many as 30 observers or staff assistants.

Those interested may apply for positions as senators, representatives or observers. Interview signup sheets and applications, which should be returned before the interview, will be at the Union Information Desk starting Wednesday.

Interviews will be November 1, 2, 8 and 9 from 3 to 5 p.m. There will be night interviews November 13 for those unable to attend an afternoon interview.

Last year's delegation, under Robertson's chairmanship, won the award for the best delegation at the NCSL.

Robertson said each member of the delegation would have to carry the expense of his room and board. Those who apply for positions may be accepted as alternates.

Book sale today

A used book sale will be held today from 12 to 9 p.m. and Wednesday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Chapel Hill Public Library.

More than 5,000 volumes are on sale in more than 25 categories, including three novels in Afrikaans.

The sale is being sponsored by the Friends of the Library. Proceeds will be used to purchase new library books.
