# Curtis Mayfield, Leo Kottke, 'Images'

Curtis Mayfield entertains at 8 -p.m. Sunday, March 4 in Carmichael Auditorium. Tickets at \$4 go on sale today at the Carolina Union Information Desk.

Long an established performer on the contemporary music scene, Curtis Mayfield's dynamic score for the hit film "Superfly" has confirmed the entertainer's presence in the Seventies.

Mayfield's solo singing career began in earnest in the Chicago of the late Fifties. He and friend Jerry Butler then joined Samuel Gooden and Fred Cash. They called themselves the Impressions.

After the wide success of "For Your Precious Love," Butler left to pursue a solo career and Curtis Mayfield blew out of the Windy City as lead singer of the Impressions. "People Get Ready," "Gypsy Woman," and "We're a Winner" were important lyrical and musical links among the group's chain of hits that remain an integral part of the Sixties music scene.

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
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
