## Board to discuss park plan

The Chapel Hill Board of Aldermen will receive a plan for the development of Umstead Park when they meet in a joint meeting with the Planning Board, the Appearance Commission, and the Recreation Commission at 7:30 tonight in the Municipal Building.

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both recommend approval of the Recreation Department's plan for the development of Umstead Park, which includes the realignment of Umstead

Drive at an approximate cost of \$60,000. The board will also discuss a possible reorganization of the planning process with the Planning Board, the Appearance Commission and the Recreation Commission.

The Planning Board will also request that the Board of Aldermen deny a construction of Village West Apartments and ask approval of the preliminary and final plans for Farrington Road Estates.

There will also be a status report on drainage; consideration of selection of a town auditor; the annual report of the Recreation Department; consideration of legislative bills to repeal food tax, tax property of medical services, uniformly tax bank property and tax relief for elderly land owners; and hear a request for funding for the North Carolina Botanical Garden.
