

# Indochina relief attempt fails

North Carolina peace groups failed Sunday in their attempt to deliver a shipment of clothing and medical supplies destined for Indochina to officials of the Military Ocean Terminal at Sunny Point, N.C. (MOTSU).

Peace groups envisioned Sunday's demonstration as an effort to send supplies of this type to Indochina as an alternative to MOTSU's traditional cargo of anti-personnel weapons, white

phosphorus rounds and thickeners for napalm.

The American Friends Service Committee-Southeast region, North Carolina Resistance, Greensboro Peace Center, Community of War Tax Resisters (Durham) and other area peace organizations had publicized Sunday's protest over the past three months through a statewide coalition known as the MOTSU Project.

Project spokesman Bill Ramsey and approximately 75 people, including students from UNC-Chapel Hill, Duke

and Guilford, gathered at the access road to the military shipping terminal and presented Terry Provance, an official of Medical Aid for Indochina, with several thousand dollars in contributions for Vietnam relief aid.

In addition to Provance, protesters heard several officials of the MOTSU Project outline their objections to the shipment of weaponry from the North Carolina port.

"This port's single function is the shipment of instruments of death. In the last year it has shipped over one million tons of munitions and bombing ordnance to Indochina. Perhaps the very cargo leaving Sunny Point this week will make next week's bombing of Cambodia possible," Ramsey said.

Speaking on behalf of Colonel Sunder, the commanding officer of MOTSU, military officials at the gates refused to

accept approximately 25 parcels carried by the protesters, and in a prepared statement said, "We have no authority for shipment of non-military items."

After a 45 minute silent vigil at the MOTSU gates, protest participants returned to the military post entrance, leaving a small number of parcels and demonstrators behind. MOTSU Project officials said that an all-night vigil at the gates would be maintained in the hope that military officers would reconsider their decision.

Confronted with the refusal of MOTSU officials to recognize their demands, protest leaders are currently discussing other actions that will continue to publicize their efforts. A symbolic blockade of the Cape Fear River on which MOTSU shipping facilities are located has been one suggestion for future projects.





## Former department head Robert Ross dead at 73

Dr. Robert L. Ross, a former chairman of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at UNC School of Medicine, died Sunday of an apparent heart attack at the age of 73.

Ross, who was a native of Morganton, came to UNC in 1952. He served as

president of the North Carolina Medical Society, and in 1969 he was installed as president of the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology.

Ross is survived by two sons, a daughter and one brother. Funeral arrangements are incomplete at this time.
