

Lottery rank important

Room sign-up continues

Room sign up for those students who wish to change dorms will be held April 25, 26 and 27 in the Housing Office in Bynum Hall.

Those students who participated in the lottery should check the lottery schedule posted in Bynum and on the window of The Daily Tar Heel office to determine when to sign up for a room. Students are urged to appear at the proper time or risk losing their place in the lottery list.

If a student is unable to sign up for a room at the time his lottery number is scheduled to appear, he can have a friend sign up for him. The student signing must have the completed room application card and housing contract in order to sign up for a room.

Yesterday afternoon concluded sign up procedures for those students who wish to stay in their present dorms. The Office of Residence Life will begin filing

procedures today in order to determine available rooms in University housing.

"The sign up procedure has gone pretty well. Only a few students missed signing up for rooms by the deadlines announced," said Elizabeth Nail of the Housing Office.

The new sign-up form with the housing contract attached was credited with saving time in this year's procedures.

No summer school room sign up will take place until April 30. According to officials, there is no shortage of summer school housing on campus but a student should not wait until the first day of classes to apply for a room. If more students wish to live in dorms during the summer than have presently been predicted additional dorms will be opened.

According to housing office officials, the only dorm rooms presently available for incoming freshman girls are on South Campus. All north campus dorm quotas in women's dorms have been filled for incoming students.

The Housing Office does not assign off-campus housing. Many students have requested this service. The Housing Office does maintain a listing of realtors in Chapel Hill and posts notices of available rooms on a bulletin board in the Housing Office.

Coed among those arrested at protest

A Carolina student and two Chapel Hill residents were arrested Monday with five other persons at the Military Ocean Terminal at Sunny Point, N.C. after participating in an anti-war demonstration.

The demonstration was done in the "complete spirit of non-violence," said Sally Ann Munro, a graduate student in RTVMP, the coed who was arrested.

The Chapel Hill residents arrested were John Wagner and Lucy Wagner. Also arrested were William Ramsey, Mrs. Lyle

Snider and Joseph Alvarez, all of Durham; Joe Volk of High Point; and Liz Wheaton of Greensboro.

The eight were charged with impeding traffic.

The demonstration culminated two days of protest activities by North Carolina peace groups centering on the MTSU facility. The protesters were objecting to the shipment of ammunition and bombing ordinance that usually leave the base for Indochina.

4 professors win fellowship

Four UNC professors are among 339 scholars, scientists and artists to receive John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation Fellowships for 1973.

Dr. Stephen B. Baxter, history professor, will study the history of Britain and Hanover from 1739 to 1763. Baxter, a Massachusetts native, received his B.A. from Harvard and his Ph.D. from Cambridge, England.

Dr. R.C. Elson, biostatistics professor

and research associate in pathology, received his B.A. and M.A. in natural sciences from Cambridge University and his Ph.D. in animal breeding from Cornell University, N.Y. His research will focus on analytical methods in human genetics.

History professor Dr. John M. Headley, a Princeton graduate, received his Ph.D. from Yale University. He will prepare a critical edition of the autobiography of Mercurino de Gattinara.

Dr. Brooks Otis, Paddison Professor of Latin, will study the transcendence of tragedy. A Harvard graduate, Otis joined the UNC faculty in 1970 after teaching at Earlham College, Hobart College and Stanford University.

The four UNC fellowship recipients were selected from a field of 2,416 applicants from the U.S. and Canada. The 1973 Guggenheim awards total more than \$3,850,000.
