Reds overrun Cambodian town
 PHNOM PENH—A force of about 1,500 Communists overran the central market place at Tran Khnar south of Phnom Penh on embattled Highway 3 Tuesday and field reports said government defenders engaged them in fierce hand-to-hand combat.

Shultz doubts wage-price freeze
 WASHINGTON—Treasury Secretary George P. Shultz said today he doubts President Nixon is considering a new wage-price freeze, but he refused to deny that the administration is thinking of tightening up economic controls in less drastic ways.

U.S. may reduce bases abroad
 WASHINGTON—Defense Secretary Elliot L. Richardson, detailing post-Vietnam economy plans to shut down or reduce 274 domestic U.S. military installations, said Tuesday he is making an intensive study of similar cutbacks in America's world-wide bases abroad.

Ellsberg reveals motives in trial
 LOS ANGELES—Daniel Ellsberg told a jury Monday that he copied the Pentagon Papers because he felt the Vietnam War would never end until Congress and the American people had the information in the secret documents.

Six injured at Wounded Knee
 PINE RIDGE, S.D.—Indians at Wounded Knee and federal marshals surrounding them exchanged gunfire today and a federal spokesman said at least six of the Wounded Knee occupiers were wounded.

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Kissinger may confer with Tho

WASHINGTON—President Nixon may dispatch Henry A. Kissinger to Paris to confer with Hanoi's chief peace negotiator Le Duc Tho on the deteriorating military situation in Indochina, the White House indicated Tuesday.

At the same time, there were mounting expressions of concern on Capitol Hill about the renewed bombing in Laos and the continued use of U.S. air power in Cambodia, and apprehension that the next target might be North Vietnam.

understood the United States has requested a meeting but there was concern that North Vietnam might not agree to it.

Kissinger himself told reporters that he had no present plans to go, but did not deny reports of a possible trip.

"There is nothing set on a Kissinger visit to Paris at this time," Deputy Press Secretary Gerald L. Warren told reporters, but added: "I wouldn't rule out the possibility of any appropriate step we might take in this direction."

Nixon cites Watergate progress

WASHINGTON—President Nixon announced Tuesday that a new investigation he has ordered into the Watergate affair had uncovered "major developments" and resulted in "real progress" toward determining the truth behind the controversy.

Without elaborating, Nixon said he ordered the inquiry on March 21 "as a result of serious charges" which came to his attention. The investigation, he said, was intended to determine whether any members of his administration were involved in political espionage activities in last year's campaign.

U.S. aircraft Monday resumed bombing Laos, following a several-week lull, after North Vietnamese forces over-ran a Laotian village. U.S. officials said the action was in reaction to a "flagrant, overt, unprompted and unjustified" Communist attack. They said the U.S. strikes would not be on a daily basis.

Nixon was reported to be considering several options to bolster the allied position in the area, in addition to the bombing in Cambodia and Laos. But sources stressed that no consideration was being given at this time to a resumption of the bombing of North Vietnam.

Busing plans approved

WASHINGTON—Acting under a court order, the administration Tuesday approved the first school desegregation plans involving busing since President Nixon asked Congress last year for a busing moratorium.

The plans were approved by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) under a ruling last Feb. 16 by U.S. District Court Judge John H. Pratt. He ordered the government to initiate desegregation proceedings against more than 200 public school and college systems in 17 states.

Police arrest Indians, blacks
 RALEIGH—About 20 Tuscarora Indians and black supporters who had camped out since Saturday on the steps of the State Indian Commission were surrounded and arrested by Raleigh police Tuesday.

The arrests, including Indian Chief Howard Brooks and black civil rights leader Golden Frinks, took place 15 minutes after state officials told them to vacate state property.

"I don't want you to put your hands on me unless you want to kill me," shouted Brooks. "We will go peacefully."
