# Tar Heels meet W&M

UNC will be facing what could be its toughest opponent in recent years when it opens its season against William and Mary Saturday in Kenan Stadium.

The Indians have a veteran team this year and are rated as one of the favorites in the Southern Conference.

The Tar Heels face a number of problems as they prepare for Saturday's game. UNC

lost 13 of its 22 starters which racked up an 11-1 record and a victory over Texas Tech in the sun bowl.

"We're not very deep," Dooley says, "and that is our major concern. We've got to develop better backup men. So far in the pre-season work, the play of the reserves has been very inconsistent."

Carolina does have a number of key

players returning this year, including Nick Vidnovic who will lead the team at quarterback, teammates Ted Leverenz and Jimmy Jerome at offensive back, and full back Dick Oliver.

Tailback Sammy Johnson and Billy Hite are also returning along with tackles Peter Talty, Ronnie Robinson, linebackers Jimmy DeRatt and Terry Taylor and defensive back Phil Lamm.

Carolina's last confrontation with William and Mary resulted in a touchdown and a two-pointer in the final minute that edged the Indians 36-35.

"What really concerns us is the fact that so many of those same players will be on the field for William and Mary game next Saturday," Dooley said. "What was predominately a sophomore team. Now those players are seasoned and they're tough," he added.

The Tar Heels will kick off against the Indians at 1:30 Saturday. Tickets for the game are still available at Carmichael.

Carolina will play its second game of the 1973 season September 29 when they will take on the Missouri Mizzous in Kenan Stadium.

# Conference football

The ACC football powers will all be in action this weekend in what should pan out to be an interesting slate of pairings across the South.

Duke opens its season against the Volunteers of the University of Tennessee at their Knoxville campus. The Blue Devils should encounter stiff competition from the Vols, who have been consistently rated high in the national top twenty preseason polls.

Wake Forest will oppose the Seminoles of Florida State Saturday night in Winston-Salem.

Maryland will entertain powerful West Virginia at College Park Saturday afternoon. If the Terrapins are as the Maryland press would have us believe, it might be a close game for the Terps against the team that got the sour bite at last year's Peach Bowl.

The only conference match of the weekend will pit the Wolfpack of North Carolina State against the University of Virginia Cavaliers. Both squads were victorious last weekend against clearly undermatched teams.

The exchange is planned by students at UNC and the University of Toronto.

This year during the third week in November, the Canadians will once again travel south to spend a week with their North Carolina cohorts — better known as "cos" in exchange lingo.

Highlights of the visit will include the

Wake Forest-UNC football game, dinner with Carolina professors, seminars about the South and beer at Town Hall.

The Canadians will live with their cos while they are here. Fraternities and sororities, professors, administrators and residence halls will help provide food.

Last year all Carolina students helped entertain the Canadians at a square dance at the Tin Can.

Following the Canadian visit, the Toronto students will return the Southern hospitality with their own brand when the UNC students visit Toronto in January.

This year, as in the past, the Tar Heels will visit Canadian art galleries, hockey games and a beer brewery. They will also meet and talk with Canadian professors.

Honorary chairman of this year's exchange is Dean of Student Affairs Donald Boulton.
