Plans to elevate women

NOW chapter will meet

The Chapel Hill chapter of the National Organization for Women (NOW) will hold its first meeting of the academic year at 7:30 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 30, at the home of Miriam Sifkin, 313 Burlage Circle.

The meeting is being held to acquaint prospective members and other interested people with the goals and plans of NOW. Sifkin, president of the organization, stated that this year's goals are to improve the status of women on campus, especially through the Affirmative Action committee and the Association of Women Students and to educate women on the credit system so that they may handle their financial affairs competently.

All members of the University community are invited. Sifkin urges anyone with a complaint that needs attention to come. Interested people will be able to join one or more of the NOW task forces in such areas as child care, education, employment discrimination, sports, masculine mystique, minority women, religion, politics and others.

NOW is a feminist organization of both men and women committed to bringing women into full partnership with men in all aspects of social life. National membership fees are \$10, but student membership is \$5. The local chapter is three years old. "But the group has really only become active in the past year," said Sifkin.

Registration held for student voters

Student Body President Ford Runge urged students Monday to take advantage of voter registration on campus and to register to vote.

The Orange County Board of Elections has authorized two days this week, Monday and Wednesday, for on-campus registration in Woollen Gym.

One reliable observer, who declined to be identified, said he felt that about 250 people had registered Monday. Last year, about 500 students registered each day during a similar two-day registration at Woollen Gym.

Those who do not register at Woollen Gym can still register until Oct. 9 at the Municipal Building in Chapel Hill. The Nov. 6 election is being held for city elections and a statewide liquor referendum.

"The most effective way I know of to guarantee power for any group is to vote," said Runge. "If students expect to have a say in workings of this community they must be prepared at the very least to influence this town with their vote."

"The most important aspect of the registration drive is the question of who will represent students on the town board," he said.

Anyone who has been a resident of Orange County for 30 days will be able to sign up to vote. Registration at Woollen Gym will be held from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

3 run-offs to be held

Run-off elections will be held in three districts Wednesday to fill vacant seats on the Campus Governing Council.

The run-offs in Graduate Districts I and VI and Off-Campus Undergraduate District III are necessary because no candidate received a majority of the ballots cast.

Larry Misner is the only candidate on the ballot in GD I and Robert Woodard will be the only name on the ballot in UD III.

In GD VI, the candidates are Rod Kivett, who lead the voting for that seat in last week's election, Frank Kessler and Richard Lael.

The polls will be open from 10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.
