Friends to show film greats

The Chapei Hill Film Friends begins its fourth delicious Bunuclian studies of love and death. subscription season Friday, and true to form, it is showing films that are little seen and little known. 1. myself, have seen only three of the films-for this semester. But I am sure, as in seasons past, many, if not most of the films, will turn out to be masterpieces. Some of the films last semester gave me as much delight as any I have ever seen.

The films, of course, come from all over the globe and from throughout film history. Starting off the series is the two-part Ivan the Terrible, shown on two consecutive weekends. The first part, at least, is a film of stunning beauty and may well be Eisenstein's finest film. The second part includes the only color scenes that Eisenstein ever filmed and was banned until 1958. The music for both parts is by the famous Russian composer Prokofiev.

From Sweden comes Here's Your Life, the first film by Jan Troell, who also did The Emigrants. In Esquire, John Simon praised this film and lamented the heavy cutting of the American version. The Film Friends is showing an uncut print.

The film society will also show Summerskin by Leopold Torre Nilson, whose End of Innocence and Hand in the Trap, shown in previous semesters were

From France comes The Wages of Fear, reputed to be one of the most harrowing pieces of suspense ever made, in which some men truck dynamite over hazardous terrain. It stars a very young Yves Montand. Also French is Yo-Yo, a comedy by Pierre Etaix, who was in Fellini's Clowns, and whose short Happy Anniversary is a delight.

From Italy comes The Lady Killer of Rome, directed by Elio Petri, an interesting if rather difficult director. and starring the great Marcello Mastroianni. I noticed with great displeasure that it is dubbed.

From Japan comes The Burmese Harp, a film of a young man who finds peace away from the hell of war. Directed by Kon Ichikawa, it won the San Giorgio Prize at the Venice Film Festival as the film which best shows man's capacity to live for one another.

And from Poland comes The Passenger, a brilliant depiction of the tensions in a Nazi women's camp.

As in the past, this series is the only place in the area where you can see silents, aside from Potemkin, etc. There are five this semester. The first is Long Pants, a Harry Langdon film. Other Langdon films show in the series have been dogs, but this one was directed by Frank Capra, so there should be some improvement. Erich Von Stroheim, surely a legend, is represented by Blind Husbands, his first feature. It was quite a scandal in its day, the Last Tango of 1319.

From Germany comes People on Sunday, a film dealing with an outing of an ordinary group of people. This one is especially interesting because it was written by Billy Wilder and Fred Zinnemann before they fled Hitler for the United States.

From Russia there is a truly exciting film, Mother, directed by Vsevolod Pudovkin. In many circles, this film has a greater reputation than Potemkin.

And finally from Denmark there is a remarkable expressionistic semi-documentary. Witchcraft Through the Ages.

Shorts shown at various programs include Brais (Laurel and Hardy). The Goat (Buster Keaton), and Ballet Mechanique, a French avant-garde film of the 1920's.

Fourteen programs in all for only \$7, a buy which should be irresistible. Since singles admissions cost \$1.50, the savings is quite good. You are practically guaranteed many exceptional evenings.

Beginning this Friday, shows are Friday at 9:30 p.m. and Saturday at 11:30 p.m. in Carroll Hall.
