Wheat import quotas may be lifted

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon soon will suspend wheat import quotas as a hedge against possible domestic shortages, an administration source said Thursday. The prediction followed warnings from the bakery industry Wednesday that exports would deplete U.S. wheat supplies by next spring and force the price of bread up \$1 for a large loaf.

Panama canal talks planned

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States and the Panamanian government have agreed to reopen talks on the future of the Panama Canal, the State Department reported Thursday. Department officials said U.S. ambassador at large Ellsworth Bunker worked out the agreement with Panamanian Foreign Minister Juan Antonio Tack during a 41-hour mission to Panama City.

Second major storm batters east

A snow and ice storm Thursday spread winter woes across two-thirds of the nation from Texas to New England. The mercury froze in thermometers on the northern plains. King-sized traffic jams glutted highways in Ohio, where up to eight inches of snow fell. Eighteen inches of snow piled up at Sedalia, Mo. Fresh snows moved into the New York metropolitan area close on the heels of Wednesday's five-inch snowfall.

Kissinger leaves for Mideast

WASHINGTON (UPI) Advancing his planned Middle East trip by 10 days, Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger arranged to take off Thursday amid reports of an imminent Egyptian attack on Israeli forces on the west bank of the Suez Canal. In Washington the State Department denied knowledge of any planned attack. He was to leave at midnight EDT. Kissinger said Thursday he expects to obtain concrete proposals during his visits to Egypt and Israel that will lead to separation of their forces along the Suez Canal. "What we expect to do," Kissinger told a news conference, "is see whether we can transform general ideas into a concrete proposal. We hope that after such concrete proposals have been developed, it will lead to serious Israeli-Egyptian negotiations at Geneva for the separation of forces." On the subject of the energy crisis, Kissinger Thursday warned the nations of

the world against unrestricted competition to secure their own oil supplies, declaring "no single country can solve the problem by itself." "It is essential for all concerned to understand we are truly interdependent," Kissinger said. He pointed out that the United States was in the best position to engage in unilateral talks with the Arab states to ensure its oil supplies. But, he said, "We believe unrestricted bilateral competition would be ruinous." In a news conference, Kissinger urged the oil consuming nations to work together to solve the energy crisis. Kissinger, who said he expected the oil producing nations to meet three months later at a second conference, stressed that the energy crisis could not be solved by a single nation or a single group of nations. What President Nixon hopes to propose at the conference of consuming nations is a

frame-work which would assure oil supplies for all the world. In an apparent illusion to a massive oil deal worked out by France with Saudi Arabia, Kissinger said that "even those who steal a march" cannot avoid a future crisis over oil supplies. He said the United States was aware of the "temptations" to make bilateral arrangements for oil, but he said "unrestricted" bilateral competition would be "ruinous." Kissinger again repeated his argument that the Arab oil embargo was no longer "appropriate." He pointed out that the United States played a major role in ending the latest Arab-Israeli war and has made "a major effort" to produce a peace agreement.

Simon said in an announcement that the investigation by a special task force is two-fold: "to verify the accuracy of refiner reports on crude oil and product supplies" and "to ensure that petroleum product price increases are justified." He said the task force drawn from the FEO and the Internal Revenue Service "has begun auditing price, profit, and supply records of every petroleum refiner in the country."

Simon orders investigation

WASHINGTON (UPI) Energy director William E. Simon, responding to charges the government is getting inaccurate information on the nation's fuel situation, Thursday ordered a thorough audit of all petroleum firms.


