## A chance for revenge

The North Carolina Tar Heels get a longawaited chance for revenge against Wake Forest Wednesday night when the old rivals clash in an Atlantic Coast Conference game at Carolina Auditorium.

The contest will get under way at 8 p.m. with another sellout crowd of 8,800 looking on. Junior varsity teams of the two schools tangle in a preliminary game at 5:55 p.m.

Using a slowdown offense. Wake Forest stunned Carolina, 54-52, in a first-round game of the ACC Tournament last March. Tar Heel players have been anxious ever since to atone for that set-back.

Carolina, ranked fifth nationally, rolled to its 10th win in 11 starts at Virginia Saturday. holding off a late Cavalier surge for an 87-75 decision. Back-court star Darrell Elston was the man in the clutch for the Tar Heels in that game.

Coach Dean Smith says he hopes his team will play with the same type of enthusiasm Wednesday night that it displayed in two road wins last week. "Sometimes when you win on the road and then come home, you have a tendency to relax," Smith said. "We can't afford that against a team as good as



Smith feels the addition of junior college transfer Cal Stamp makes the Deacons a far stronger team than last year. "Stamp gives them the big man they needed to go with the team's outstanding quickness," he said. "The best indication I know of Wake's quickness is the fact that Duke chose to hold the ball in its game with Wake."

Despite the fact that the Deacons had success with a slowdown game against Carolina last season, Smith does not feel Wake Forest will hold the ball Wednesday. "I think Wake Forest feels now that it has the personnel to play with anyone on its schedule," he said.

Tony Byers, one of the ACC's best performers, will lead the Deacs into Carmichael Auditorium. He played a brilliant role in Wake Forest's win over Carolina last year.


