Kleindienst refutes Dean's testimony

NEW YORK—Former Attorney General Richard Kleindienst appeared Tuesday as a surprise defense witness in the conspiracy trial of John Mitchell and Maurice Stans and took issue with some of the testimony of key prosecution witness John Dean III. Kleindienst, who succeeded Mitchell as the nation's top lawman, testified he had no recollection of a telephone call from Dean in which Dean said he had been

notified by Mitchell that he, Mitchell, was being pushed around by a runaway grand jury in New York.

Calley's sentence reduced to 10 years

WASHINGTON-Army Secretary Howard H. Callaway Tuesday reduced Lt. William L. Calley's My Lai massacre sentence from 20 to 10 years on grounds Calley might have sincerely believed he was only obeying orders.

Callaway's decision makes Calley eligible for parole in six months and moves his case into the hands of President Nixon, who could reduce the sentence further or overturn the conviction. Under the law, Calley's sentence cannot be increased.



Tapes may prove Nixon innocent

KEY BISCAYNE, Fla.-A high White House official said Tuesday President Nixon will hand over to the House impeachment inquiry evidence that will prove his innocence in the Watergate cover-up. But he indicated Nixon will not comply fully with a subpoena for more than 40 taped

Subpoena sought

WASHINGTON-Special prosecutor Leon Jaworski asked a federal court Tuesday to subpoena President Nixon for tapes and documents of 64 conversations bearing on the Watergate coverup conspiracy trial starting Sept. 9.

Jaworski said he had tried repeatedly without success to obtain additional White House materials, first for the grand jury and then for the trial itself involving some of Nixon's highest former associates.

Finally, Jaworski wrote James D. St. Clair, the President's chief Watergate lawyer, last Thursday warning he would have to seek a subpoena.

Jaworski, seeking his second subpoena since he took office last November, left it to the court to set a deadline for compliance with any new subpoena.


USSR, Egypt add to tension

BEIRUT-Egypt, Syria and the Soviet Union raised the temperature in the Middle East Tuesday, with the USSR insisting on full participation in all future peace negotiations and Egypt threatening retaliation against Israeli cities with longrange rockets.

The USSR and Syria, concluding talks in which Russia reportedly agreed to arm Syria with sophisticated new weapons against Israel, also jointly condemned Kissingertype "partial settlements" for military disengagement.

At the same time, Egyptian President Anwar Sadat warned that long-range ground-to-ground rockets are still aimed at three of Israel's principal cities and will be fired if Israel attacks Egyptian cities on the Suez Canal's west bank.


