

District RHA elections today

To fill two seats left vacant by resignation

Elections for Residence Hall Association (RHA) representatives from Joyner and Carr-Old East-Old West districts will take place from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. today.

Joyner's ballot box will be located in the dorm's lobby. The Carr-Old East-Old West box will be on the north side of Carr on the steps facing Davie Hall.

Both districts petitioned a special election because their RHA representatives recently resigned.

Running from the Joyner district are Patricia Grill and Connie Warren. Nelson Higgins, Jay Levin and Walter Colton are candidates from the Carr-Old East-Old West district.

Elected representatives will serve

until mid-March when the regular RHA election takes place.

Regarding the election at Joyner, Grill said, "The only reason I'm running is because we need an RHA representative, and I feel it's my duty as Joyner vice president to represent the dorm."

Warren said her reason for running

was to "voice the opinions of Joyner residents at the RHA meetings."

Higgins said he wanted to represent Carr-Old East-Old West because last year he never heard from his representative. "If elected I'll try to become a more visible candidate."

Levin, a freshman, said the office would "give me a chance to integrate myself with the community while serving my dorm."


The two men are being held in Chapel Hill jail and the two women in county jail in Hillsborough, Gold said. Bond is set at \$1,500 each.
