Grad allocations okayed

The Graduate and Professional Student Federation approved a departmental fund allocation of \$4.77 per graduate student for fiscal year 1975 during its senate meeting Tuesday night.

Each of the 52 separate graduate departments will be allotted this amount for each fee-paying graduate or professional student enrolled. Thus, approximately \$26,000 will be allotted for the 5,597 graduate students enrolled this year.
