

# Board members protest method of selection Carrboro employs new manager

After nearly six weeks of searching, Carrboro has finally gotten a new town manager, but the new man and the way he was chosen, have already been criticized by members of the Carrboro Board of Aldermen.

The board chose Jesse L. Greeson, who served 11 years as the city clerk of Henderson, after considering two other candidates in executive session Monday night. The board's first choice declined the job last Friday.

The formal announcement of Greeson's appointment is scheduled from a press conference this afternoon.

Alderman George Beswick, has protested the procedure used in selecting Greeson and questioned Mayor Robert Wells and the board's decision.

"Monday's meeting was contrary to the charter," Beswick said Tuesday. Beswick

missed the meeting because he was out of town. "The charter says a written notice of the meeting must be delivered to each board member's residence at least six hours before the meeting."

"I am just trying to show, as I have in the past, that I don't like the way they do things, and I don't think the people do either," Beswick said.

Mayor Wells said Monday he thought Beswick understood that a meeting would be held Monday and that he tried to phone Beswick several times that day.

"You can say that we understood we would meet," Beswick said, "but that's still not following proper procedures."

Board member Braxton Foushee walked out of Monday's meeting as a protest against actions which he said were in violation of the North Carolina Open Meetings Law. Foushee objected to the selection of a town manager at the meeting and refused to participate.

Beswick also questioned Greeson's

qualifications Tuesday.

"He's substantially less qualified than either of the other two candidates we were considering," Beswick said. "The mayor thinks he's a good fellow, but I don't think so. Anybody but a base idiot would know that the other two fellows are immensely more qualified."

Beswick said he thought that Greeson had only attended Elon College, "and I assume this means he didn't finish." But the two candidates Greeson was competing against held B.S. and M.A. degrees in public and business administration.

"I realize paper education is not the only thing that should be considered, but that's all the board had to work with, because only Mayor Wells and myself actually talked with Greeson," Beswick said.

Beswick also said that after the board's first choice turned down their offer, the selection committee—composed of Wells, Alderman John Boone and himself—presented the board with a list of the three

remaining top candidates, and Greeson was not one of them.

"The only thing I can see is that the mayor really lobbied behind my back, while I was away this weekend, to get the votes he needed because he had singled this fellow (Greeson) out," he said.
