Cinema

On campus
"The Male Animal" — Who else but James Thurber could have written this innocent-yet-trenchant comedy about love and politics on a college campus, both at their zenith at the same time as the Big Football Game? Henry Fonda plays a bespectacled intellectual in trouble with the reactionary administration over the reading of a controversial letter by Vanzetti in his class. Directed by Elliott Nugent in 1942, it also stars Olivia de Havilland who will be speaking on campus later this month. (Alternative Cinema, today at 7 and 9:30 p.m., Greenlaw Auditorium, \$1.25.)
"Zazie Dans Le Metro" — Zazie is a foul-

mouthing little cynic, age eleven, who comes to Paris to spend a weekend with her uncle, a female impersonator, and nobody and nothing are quite what they seem. Made in 1960, the film moves at a rapid pace helped by some fine film editing. Pauline Kael calls this modern French farce an "anarchistic, impudent comedy," and likens it to "a Mack Sennett two-reeler running wild." Louis Malle wrote the script and directed. (Carolina Union free flick, Wednesday at 8 p.m., Great Hall.)
"Guys and Dolls" — The Demon Rumynesque underworld of New York is the background for this Frank Loesser musical about gambler Sky Masterson (Marlon Brando) and Nathan Detroit (Frank Sinatra), the owner of the oldest established permanent floating crap game in New York. The men are tough and the dames brassy, except for sweet Sarah Brown, the Salvation Army lady who captures Sky's heart. Made when Brando's star was still rising in 1955, when every role he undertook was exciting and interesting. (Alternative Cinema, Thursday at 7 and 9:30 p.m., Greenlaw Auditorium, \$1.25.)

Chapel Hill
"The Four Musketeers" — The long-awaited second half of Richard Lester's

Dumas hit stars, naturally, the same people: it was conceived as one film and aliced in two just before "The Three Musketeers" release. (Varsity, at 1, 3, 5, 7 and 9 p.m., \$2.25.)
"Murder on the Orient Express" — The film is a shade too long, and the pace isn't crackling (like it could afford to be), but it's tremendously likable. (Carolina, at 2:10, 4:30, 6:50 and 9:10 p.m., \$2.25.)
"Young Frankenstein" — Mel Brooks is in control again. (Plaza 1, at 3:05, 5:05, 7:05 and 9:05 p.m., \$2.25.)
"Alice Doesn't Live Here Anymore" — Ellen Burstyn is nominated for an Oscar for this film, the story of a woman and a second chance. Diane Ladd won a supporting actress nomination. (Plaza 2, at 2:45, 4:55, 7:05 and 9:15, \$2.25.)
"Lenny" — (Plaza 3, at 2:50, 5, 7:10 and 9:20 p.m., \$2.25.)
